IN REPLY

To Governor Smith, of New York, probable Democratic candidate for 1928 and a Roman Catholic, Charles Marshall addressed long questions which come to this: "If you were elected President would you be governed by the laws of the United States or by orders from Rome?" Governor Smith answered ably in several thousand words. Thirty-one words of his answer constitute a complete answer, as follows: "I recognize no power in the institution of my church to interfere with the operation of the Constitution of the United States or the enforcement of the laws of the land."

The Governor's letter is a great document that may eventually be marked historic. In its force and simplicity it is a worthy effort. Nor is it fair to read it as the letter of a candidate for the Presidency. In writing it the Governor himself put that consideration to one side and wrote rather as an American in public life the consistency of whose whole career has been challenged by the open suggestion that he cannot be at the same time a good Roman Catholic and a public servant faithful to the Constitution and laws of the United States.

WHO PAYS THE TAXES?

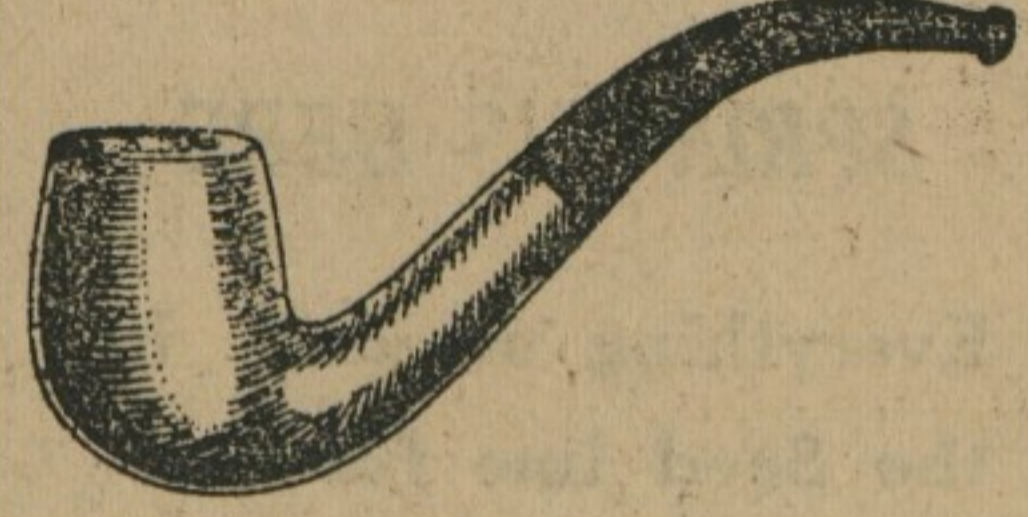
