SMITH IS BARRED

The United States senate refused
to seat Frank L. Smith, who was
appointed senator from Illinois to
fill out the unexpired term of Senator
McKinley. Senator-designate
Smith was elected last November to a
seat in the 70th congress, and the
contest ending in the recent vote
was not over his taking the seat in
to which he was elected. The same
issue will doubtless be raised, how-
ever, when he presents his certifi-
cate of election and asks admission
to the senate.

Supporters of the Reed resolution
which sought to deny a seat to
Smith until the privileges and elec-
tions committee had investigated his
fitness, included all the democrats
and fifteen republicans. Here is
raised an issue that will involve also
the seating of Vare of Pennsylvania.

It is charged that both Smith and
Vare are unfit for a seat in the
senate because they bought it. Yet
it must be remembered that the voters
of Illinois and Pennsylvania had
all the facts in their possession be-
fore the election. Senator Reed's
investigating committee pried into
the primaries of both states and the
whole country knew what Vare and
Smith spent to be nominated.

Both were elected by large ma-
jorities. Smith was defeated in
Cook county, where gun-toting Chi-
cago is located, but overcame this
handicap in the wide-open spaces of
Illinois—the small towns and rural
districts—where people are supposed
to have high political ideals.

There are the facts to be consid-
ered. Shall the people, after electing
men whom they know were sup-
ported by large public service util-
ities with questionable motives, still
be entrusted with the selection of
their own United States senate, or
shall the senate determine when the
people are right and when they are
wrong?

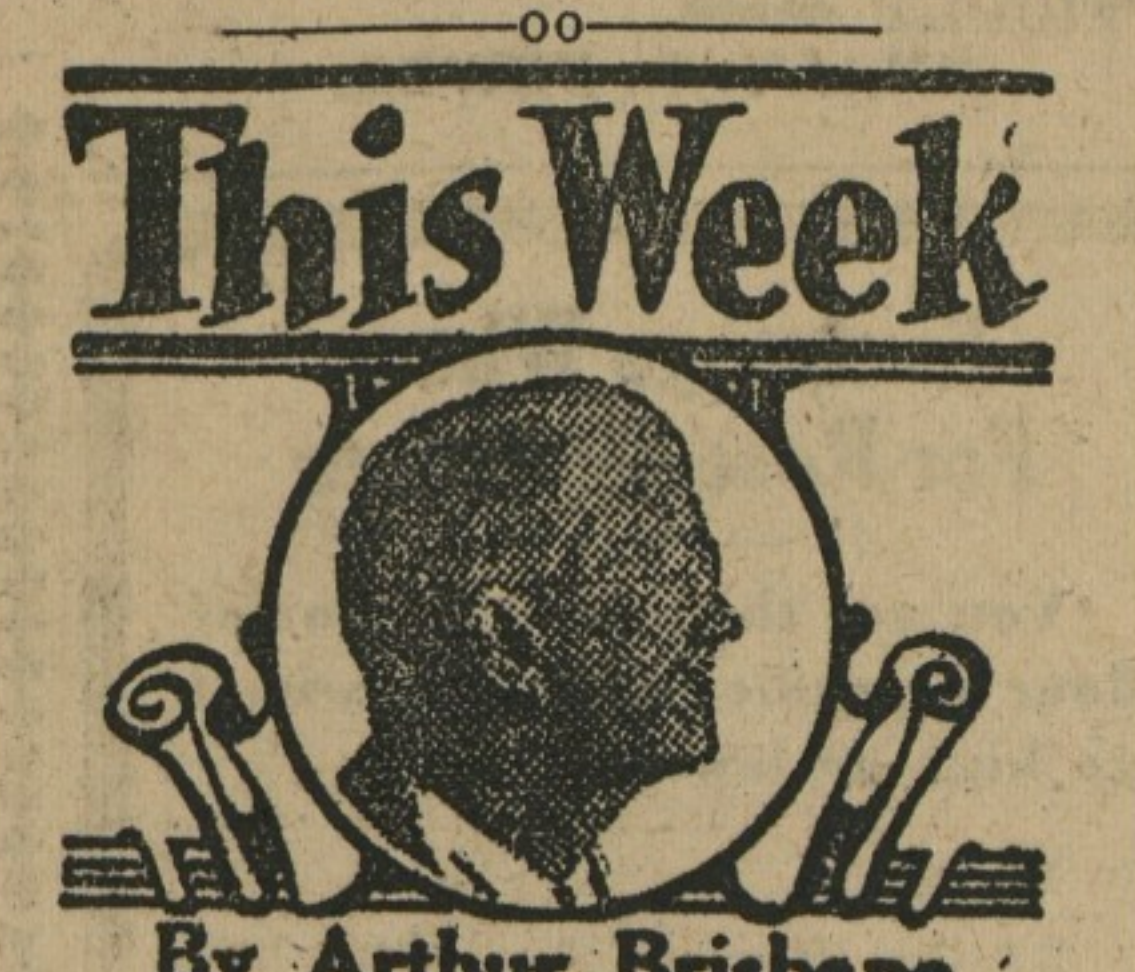
The thought is revolting and con-

TERRIBLE CHINESE—BUT.
EASY TO LIVE LONGER.
GIRTH CONTROL.

This, as Will Rogers would say, is
written on the train traveling from
Washington to New York.
Millions of Americans will be
glad to hear that the President, seen
two hours ago, seemed in perfect
health, full of energy, and amid all
the Nicaragua-Mexico excitement,
calm as a Vermont elm.

What appears to interest the
President just now is internal im-
provement, projects for canals from
the farms and facilities to the sea,
and development of unused waters
for power and irrigation, in particu-
lar development of the Colorado Ri-
ver.

President Coolidge speaks just so
fast, and no faster. He knows ev-
ery word that he is going to say be-
fore he says it. Words do not come
out and surprise him, as happens
with others.

You can't hurry him, or choose
his subject for him. And as for
holding him back, when he means
to go in a certain direction, why, to
"draw up the Leviathan with a hook"
would be child's play, compared
with it.

Chinese mobs are looting Chris-
tian churches. Too bad, and it fills
us with horror. Americans, British
French and other travelers brought
home all sorts of loot from Chinese
temples after the Boxer uprising.
But that was different, the Chinese
are only heathens.

Charles Chaplin, never very heav-
y, lost 18 pounds since his latest
worries began. The worst illness is
MENTAL illness. Chaplin who has
made millions happy and never made
anybody unhappy, would seem to
have a just complaint against fate.

The Senate rejects the Lausanne

ORDINANCE NO. 2
Passed January 9, 1927

Be it enacted and ordained,
That the occupants of real and
leasehold estate shall clean off
or caused to be cleaned off the
snow or ice that may accumu-
late on the pavement passing
along said property.

That in case of any real or
leasehold property is unoccu-
pied, then the owner or owners
of same shall clean off or caused
to be cleaned off the snow or
ice that may accumulate on the
pavement along said property.

That such snow or ice shall
be cleaned off within 24 hours
after the same has accumulat-
ed, which in the case of snow
shall date from the hour of
abatement of each particular
snow fall.

And that for any violation
of this ordinance a fine of not
more than five dollars and cost
of prosecution shall be impos-
ed, said fine and cost to be col-
lected as provided by law.

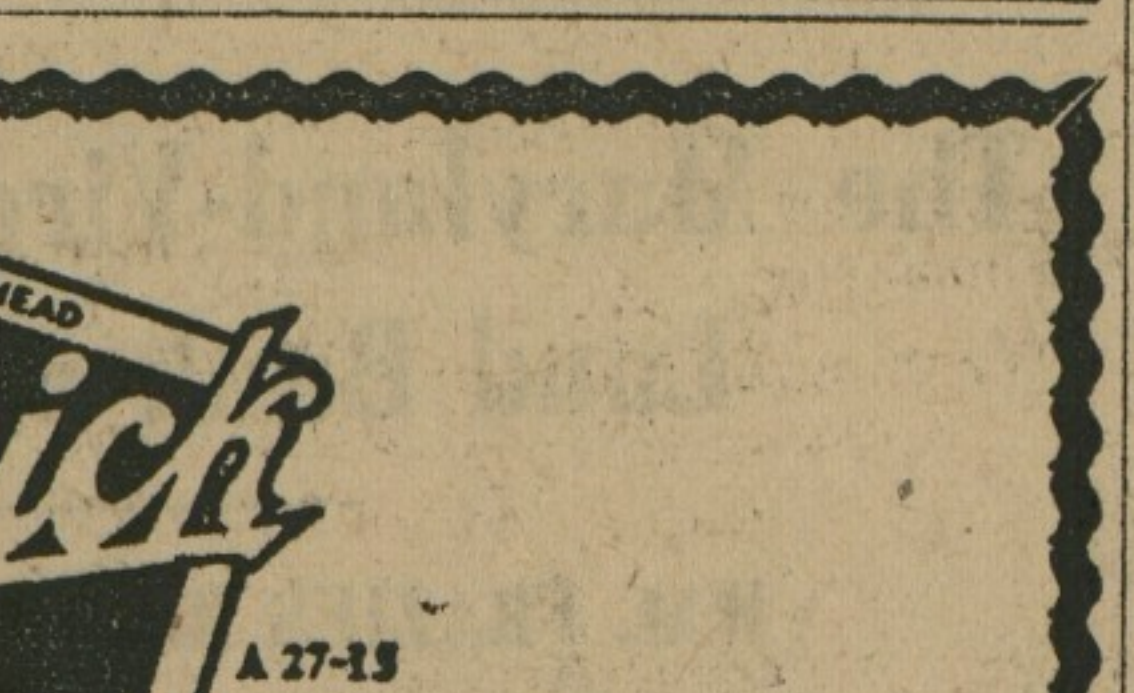
