Maryland Falls Before Attack Of Washington

Giraitis Stars For Washington

Burton Shipley's Marylanders were forced to recognize the superiority of the little Eastern Shore College last Friday evening when the Washington College "Flying Pentagon" handed them a 22 to 18 setback in basketball.

With Giraitis in the stellar role the Kibbies invaded College Park and with a grandstand finish overcame a two point lead held by the "Terrapins" went ahead and there remained until the final gun.

At half time Shipley's five held a four point advantage, 11 to 7. It was apparent, however, that the game was far from being on the ice for the Old Liners. All thru the first period the Washington five had been firing away at their basket with every shot coming close. It was mysterious how some of the shots went into the basket and out. It is rather accurately estimated that twenty-two shots, of a kind ordinarily made by the locals, were missed.

It was evident soon after the start of the contest that Giraitis was due for a large evening. The other members of the Washington five were the first to realize that such was the case and they proceeded to feed the ball to the Hartford, Conn. flash. What he did with the ball is a matter of record and history. Fourteen of Washington's total of twenty-two points were contributed by Giraitis. This number represented four fouls and six fouls. It is interesting to note that Giraitis' six foul shots were the only ones gathered by Washington. This number also represented a perfect score for "Jerry."

One big factor in Maryland's advantage at half time was the fact that the Old Line center, Adams, used his greater height to gain a considerable advantage over Seib. In the second period with Jacobs at the center position Adams found difficulty in performing his "outstretching" act.

Maryland started with a bang, piling up 5 points before the Shoremen managed to pry off the lid. It was while Maryland enjoyed this lead that Coach Kibler was heard to remark that he liked his teams to start slow. It foretold a fast ending. The Washington mentor there established himself as a prophet or, at least, as one who knows just what his team can do. The predicted fast finish won the game for the "Pentagon."

With but three minutes remaining of the contest Maryland led 18 to 16. At this point Adams committed his fourth personal foul and was removed from the game. Giraitis dropped the ball into the basket on the free throw. Carroll followed with one from the floor and a few minutes later Giraitis tossed another two pointer. Maryland called for time out, their fourth, and Washington was awarded a free shot on the technical foul penalty for more than three time outs. Giraitis made good at the try and the game ended with Cavanaugh hogging the ball in a Maryland corner.

Dean, a real half-pint athlete, was the star performer for the Old Liners. This lad, a sophomore, tips the scales at near 100, and is rather short. But, he knew what to do with the ball when within shooting distance and did it three times. Several other shots taken by this little fellow caused heart trouble on the Washington bench.

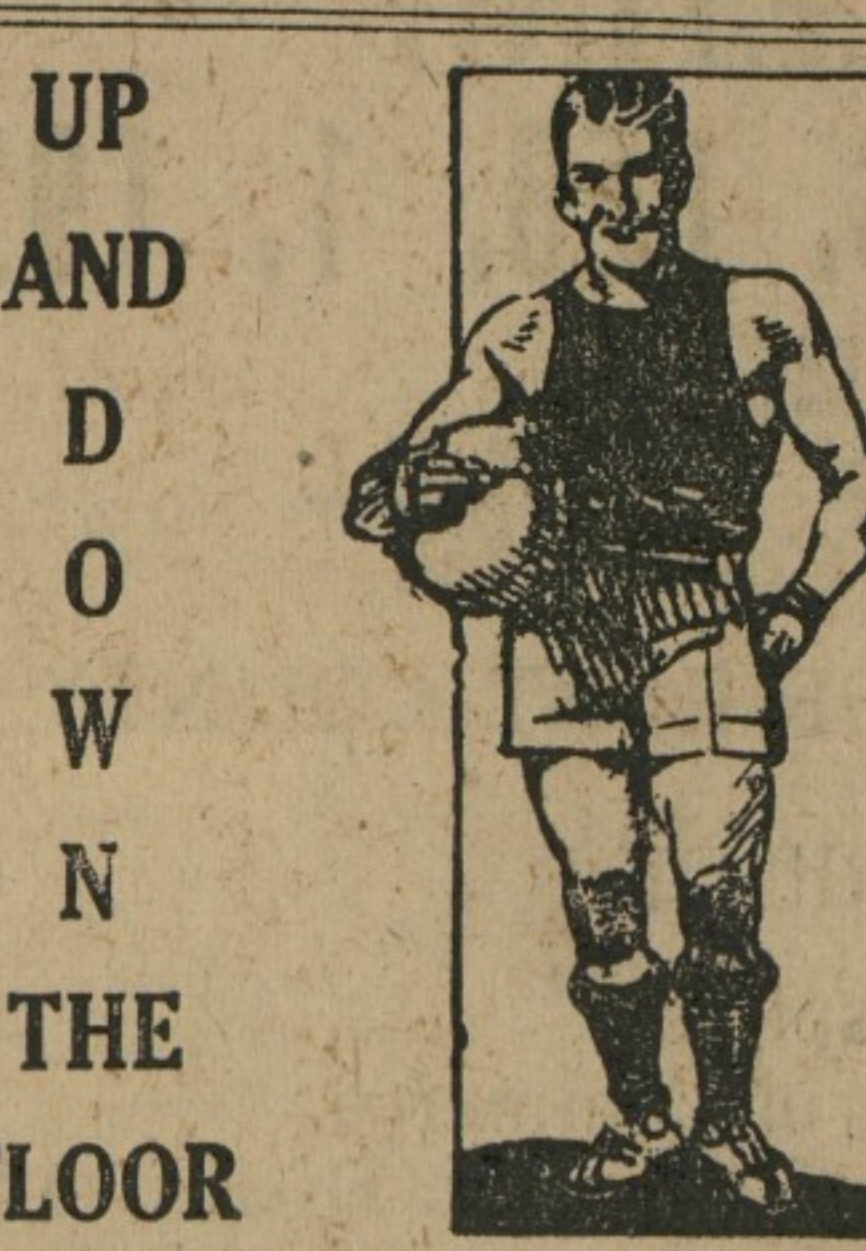
The entire Washington team played a strong defensive game, so strong in fact that the only shots made by the Maryland five were the two caged by Adams in the first half. On the other hand, Washington encountered but little trouble from the zone defense employed by the Shipley five.

Local fans who expect to witness the return game between the two teams at Carlin's in Baltimore on February 21 will have an opportunity to compare the five-man and zone defense systems, as well as the short and long pass tactics on the offense. Friday's contest gave the edge to the five-man and short pass combination as espoused by the Kibler machine.

According to Washington players they were informed before the game that they couldn't win. And their informer wasn't boasting. He, a C. U. student, was apologetic. He deplored the conditions that existed which made necessary the employment of the type of officials used in the game.

The Washington players, coach and athletic authorities take no issue with the players and students of the Catholic University. It is with the Coach and athletic authorities, of the Washington school, who engage the officials that the fault lies.

In the end they will be the ones that suffer. Teams will refuse to schedule with them and no matter how good a team it must play to win.

Sidelights On Washington-Maryland

The Diamondback, University of Maryland's Student publication in last week's issue said that Jack Carroll, of the Washington five, was the greatest basketball player in the East and South. They were right. But, after last Friday's contest, I wonder what they think of Giraitis.

Arthur Potts, official bus driver for the Washington College basketball team—for they will have no one else, feels that no small part of Washington's victory is due him. 'Tis was Potts who remembered that it was good luck to cover up fur. Accordingly, before leaving the Washington quarters before the game he placed a blanket over the fur coat of one of the Washington players.

The University of Georgia basketball team was the guest of Maryland at the Washington-Maryland contest. They didn't profit by Washington's example and lost on Saturday evening to the Old Liners 34 to 33.

Despite the heavy fog some Washington supporters made the trip out from Baltimore to College Park. All were loud in their praise of this year's "Flying Pentagon." Particularly were they enthused over Giraitis.

Coach Kibler Removes His Varsity Five From Game As Protest Against Officials

Second String Players Make Good Showing

Washington College lost to Catholic University in basketball last Saturday evening 35 to 23. With the score 17 to 14 in favor of C. U. at the start of the second half Coach Kibler withdrew his varsity five and for the remainder of the game used second string players. This action was taken as a protest against the officiating. The Washington players were informed before the game that they couldn't win.

Throughout the first period the Washington varsity struggled thru twenty minutes of football-basketball with but two fouls being called. When the same tactics were resumed in the second half, Coach Kibler realizing that his team would not be allowed to win, decided to take no chance with his varsity five and called them to the sidelines.

Jacobs, because of his fine showing against Maryland on Friday night was awarded the starting position as center for the Pentagon. Lineup and summary.

BAN B. JOHNSON IS DEPOSED BY LEAGUE OWNERS

American Circuit Head Ousted—Landis Call Off Show-down Meeting

Frank J. Navin Named As Successor

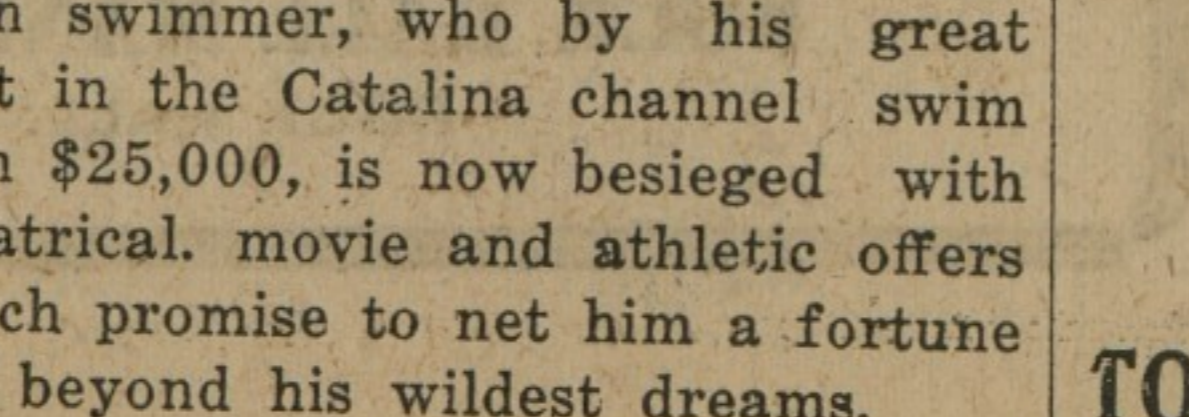
Ban B. Johnson was removed from the presidency of the American League, the organization he founded twenty-seven years ago, by his club owners at a meeting last Sunday night.

Action was taken on the eve of the showdown between Johnson and Landis, Baseball Commissioner, set for Monday, over the dismissal of Cobb and Speaker. This meeting was not held.

A statement announcing Johnson's removal said that he was suffering from ill health. Frank J. Navin, president of the Detroit Club and vice president of the league, was named to assume the duties of president.

The American League club owners not only repudiated criticism of Judge Landis, reported to have emanated from Johnson, but commended the commissioner for his activity in the recent baseball scandals.

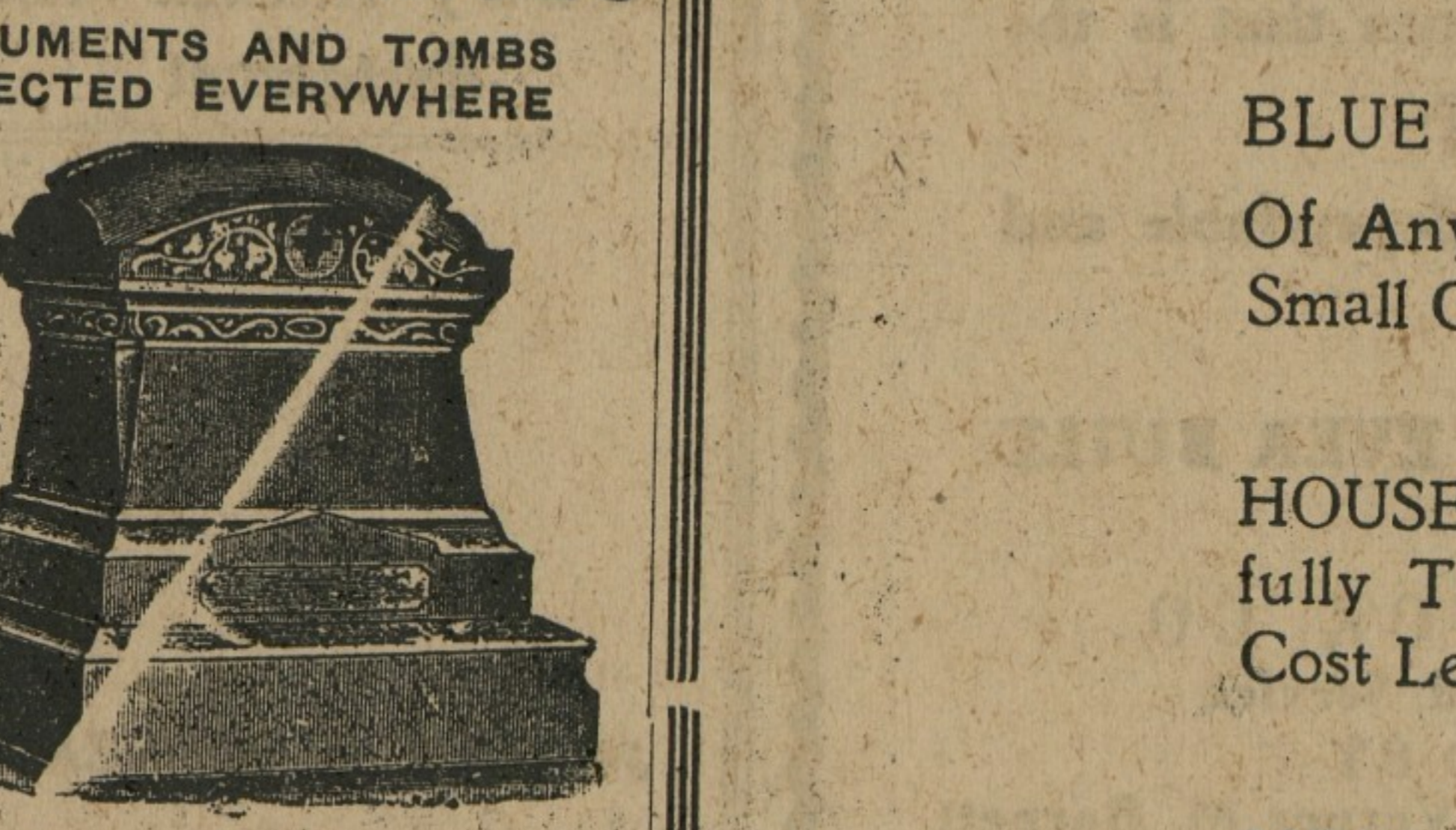
