THE SNOW THAT FELL

Town Ordinance Number 2, recently brought up-to-date by the Chestertown Commissioners, says that all snow and ice shall be removed from the side walks along the frontage of a property by the property owner within 48 hours after the end of the storm. A fine is the penalty for failing to follow this ordinance.

MAY YOUR DREAM BE REALIZED

In the current issue of the Washington College Bulletin is pictured an artists conception of the college plant after the construction of the proposed dormitory. To quote the Bulletin:

"The dimensions of the edifice are impressive. From first floor to top of cupola, the proposed dormitory measures 150 feet, the length of the front 162 feet, and the depth from front to end of side wings, 90 feet. The structure is laid out according to the unit plan, followed in the latest dormitories at Harvard, Yale and John Hopkins, each unit accommodating thirty boys and the entire building 150. Some of the rooms will house a single student, some two students each, and some will be ample for three men. Also there will be provided a few rooms for unmarried instructors and monitors.

"On the ground floor, in the main wing, will be found a reception room and the dining room and kitchen. For the time being—probably as long as the present cafeteria can take care of the feeding of the students, the dining-room and the kitchen will remain unfurnished.

"The architect has placed the dormitory on the lower campus where it will balance the present three dormitories and will form, with splendid and natural symmetry, the third side of a beautiful collegiate quadrangle with the fourth side open toward Washington Avenue."

The construction of the proposed dormitory would mean much to the business of Chestertown. At present because of inadequate living quarters, the enrollment of the college is limited to around 250 but with the new dormitory this number could be increased to nearly 500.

On Jan. 7 the first telephone conversation of record was held between the North American and European continents.

The service is available to all telephone subscribers in New York and London and the telephone company announces that service in the United States probably soon would be extended to the 15,369,454 telephones in use in this country.

From a common telephone high up in an office building in New York Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, spoke to Sir G. Evelyn Murray secretary of the British general postoffice, who was sitting in his office in London.

Without the aid of wires, the voice of Kifford was carried across some 3,000 miles of the Atlantic and Murray's voice was carried back in response.

It marked the beginning of a new means of communication across the Atlantic. Where the inauguration of trans-Atlantic telephone service may lead, none can tell. But many can recall the times, beyond their own experience, when communication with Europe was by ships which took weeks to bring their burdens across the water; how the trans-Atlantic cable has struggled along in its beginnings as an expensive luxury over which less than a million words a year were transmitted.

ORDINANCE NO. 2

Passed January 9, 1927 Be it enacted and ordained, That the occupants of real and leasehold estate shall clean off or caused to be cleaned off the snow or ice that may accumulate on the pavement passing along said property.

That in case of any real or leasehold property is unoccupied, then the owner or owners of same shall clean off or caused to be cleaned off the snow or ice that may accumulate on the pavement along said property.

That such snow or ice shall be cleaned off within 24 hours after the same has accumulated, which in the case of snow shall date from the hour of abatement of each particular snow fall.

And that for any violation of this ordinance a fine of not more than five dollars and cost of prosecution shall be imposed, said fine and cost to be collected as provided by law.

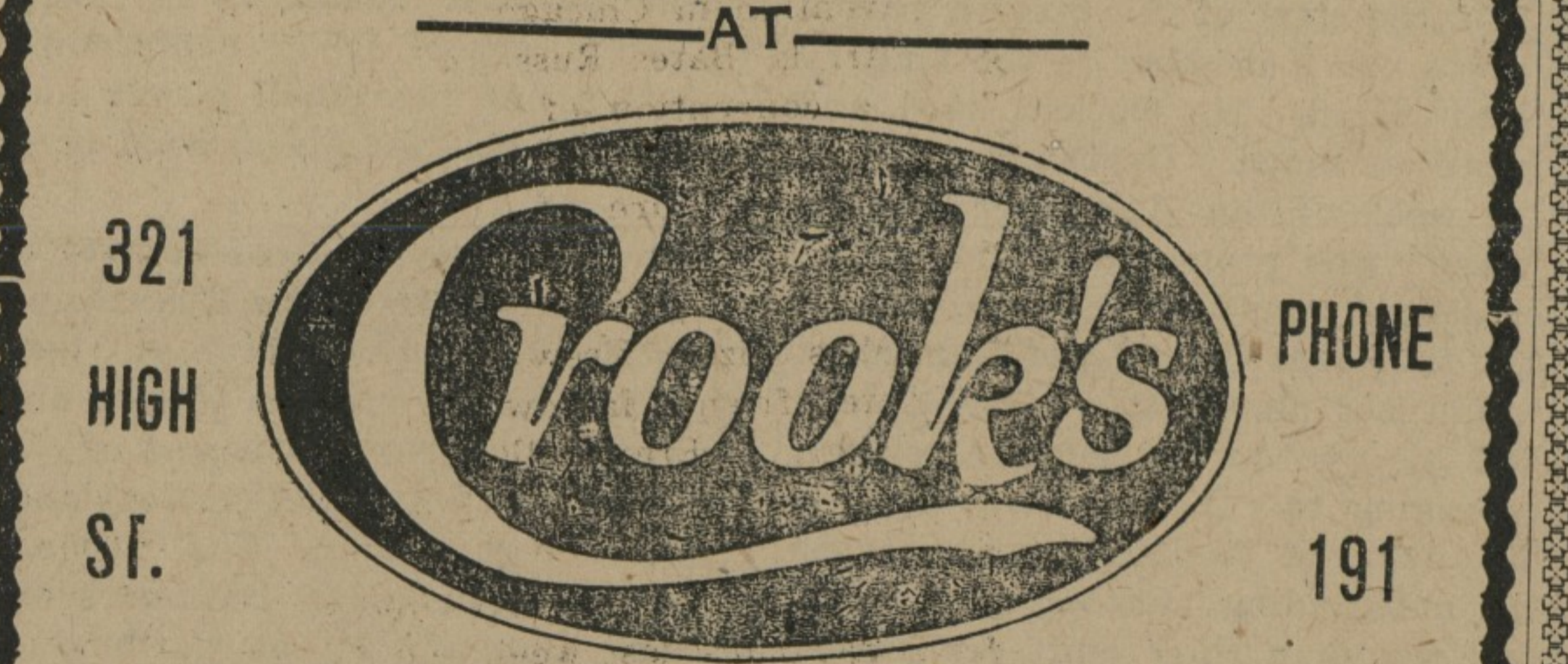
