Neheus broke loose from her husband and ran some distance to the home of a neighbor.

At this point Associate Judge Lewin W. Wickes announced that the court would take a recess until 1:45 P. M.

The court room was well filled during the opening moments of the trial and it is expected that the little courtroom will be over flowing with people of Kent when it is learned that the trial is in progress.

When the court recessed for

the afternoon session there were quite a few more people in the court room. Several women were among the spectators.

Mrs. Neheus finished her direct testimony and was cross-examined by Attorney Russell.

A touch of humor was added to the trial when Mrs. Neheus compared her running, in the effort to elude her husband, with that of a rabbit. As Mrs. Neheus is quite stout and has no appearance of being in the class of a Charley Paddock a ripple of laughter spread around the courtroom. Even the Judges indulged in a quiet snicker.

After Mrs. Neheus had left the stand the State called Homer Larimore, of East Neck Island, who testified to seeing Mrs. Neheus on the night of the alleged assault. He described her condition and told of accompanying her to the doctor.
