ROCK HALL

Memorial Day was very quiet here as there had been commemorative services Saturday in which everyone was invited to take part. The procession, preceded by the town police and the Rock Hall band, proceeded to Wesley Chapel Cemetery where the service took place. The musical numbers were "Maryland, My Maryland," "America," and "Nearer My God To Thee," a prayer and address by Rev. W. S. Grant, decoration of graves. Then to the High School grounds where games were played, the baseball game between Rock Hall and Quaker Neck being won by the first with a score of 7 to 5. Prizes for the best decorated cars were won by Miss Lillian Orr, who received a vase and flowers for her car, and Mr. Frank Mariner whose prizes was a handsome coconut cake.

Sunday was observed as Memorial Day at Wesley Chapel when the pastor Rev. C. L. Dawson preached a sermon on "Religion Patriotism." The Sunday School which met at 9:30 o'clock was finishing a contest for attendance between the Whites and Blues, the former being the victors by 187 points, the latter certain to win a banquet.
