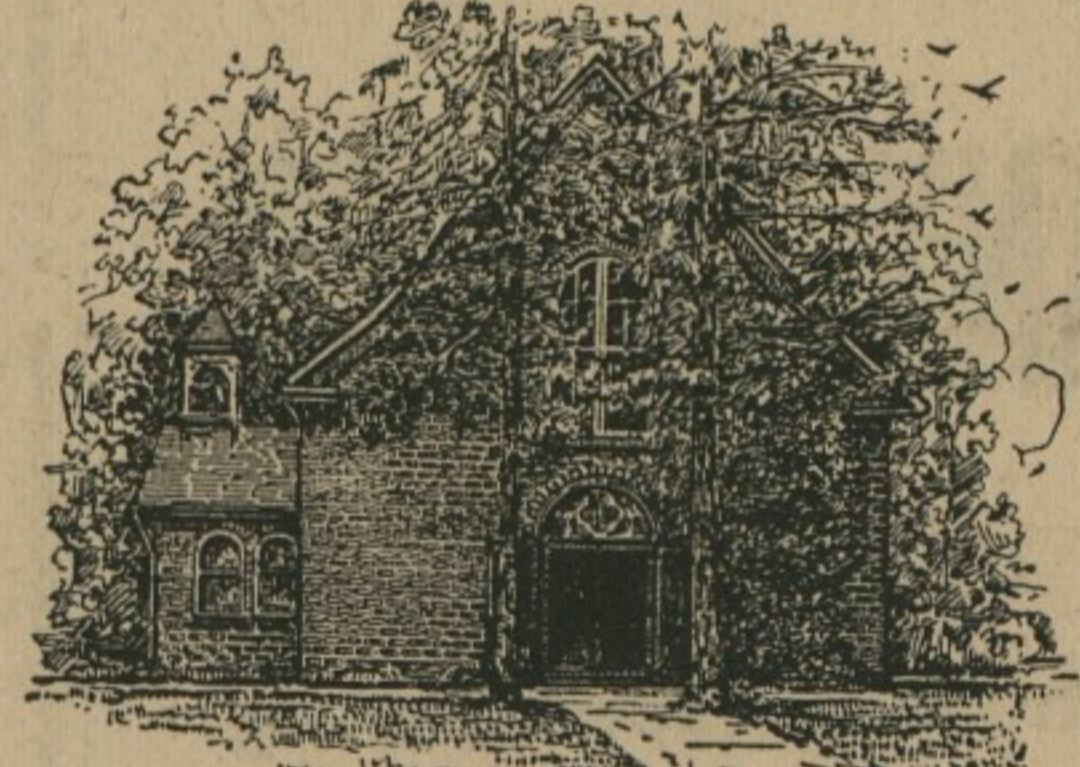

ST. PAUL'S PARISH, ESTABLISHED 1692

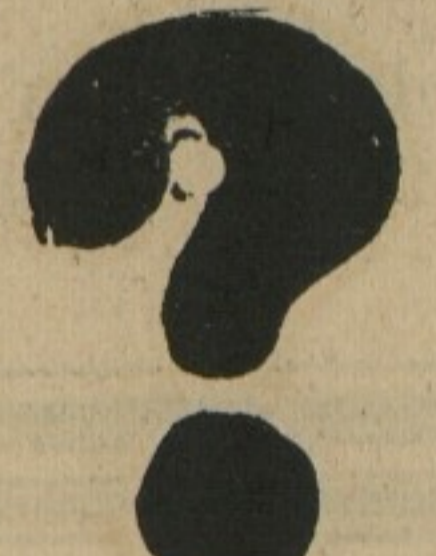


ST. PAUL'S CHURCH BUILT 1713

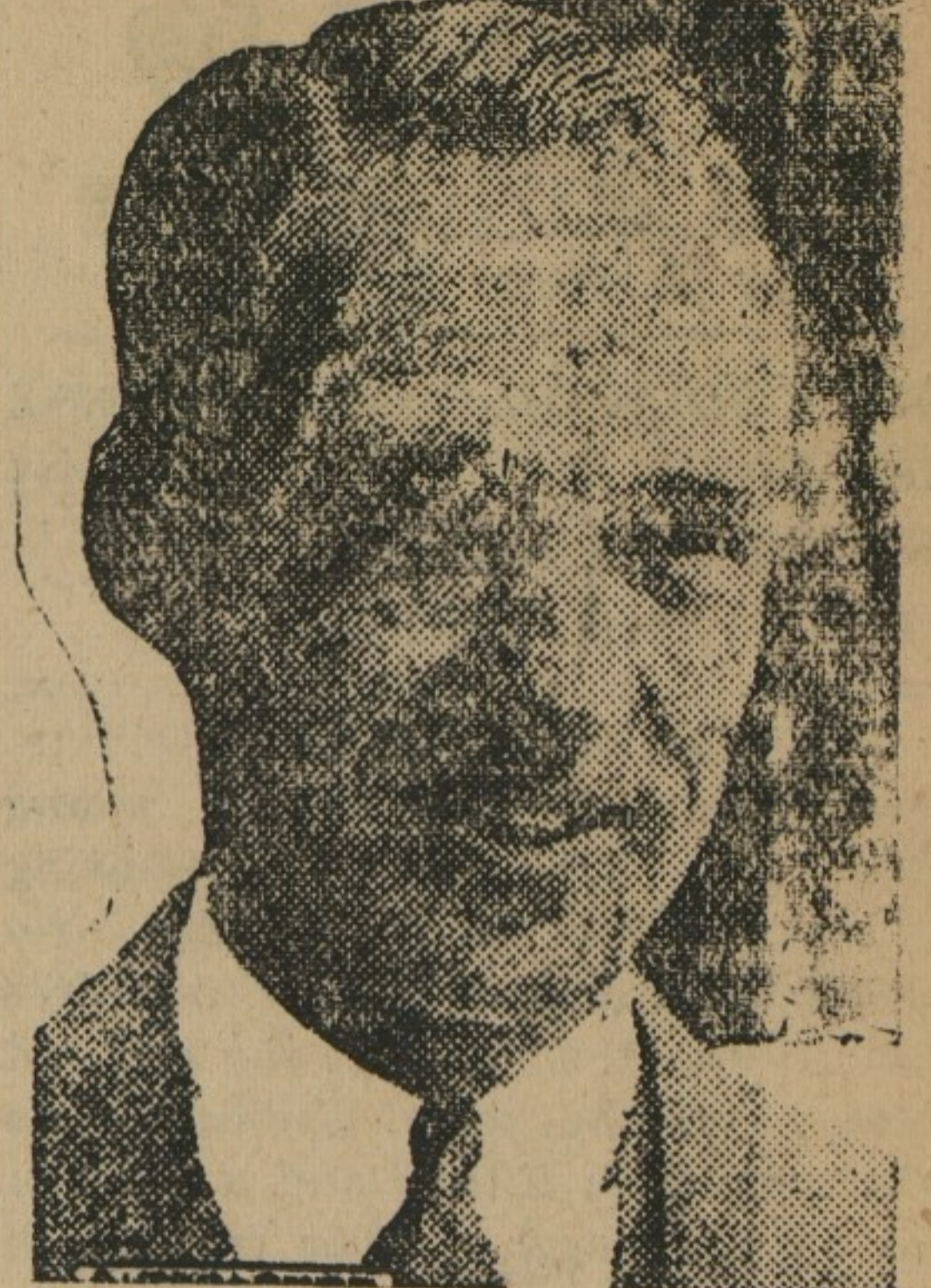
