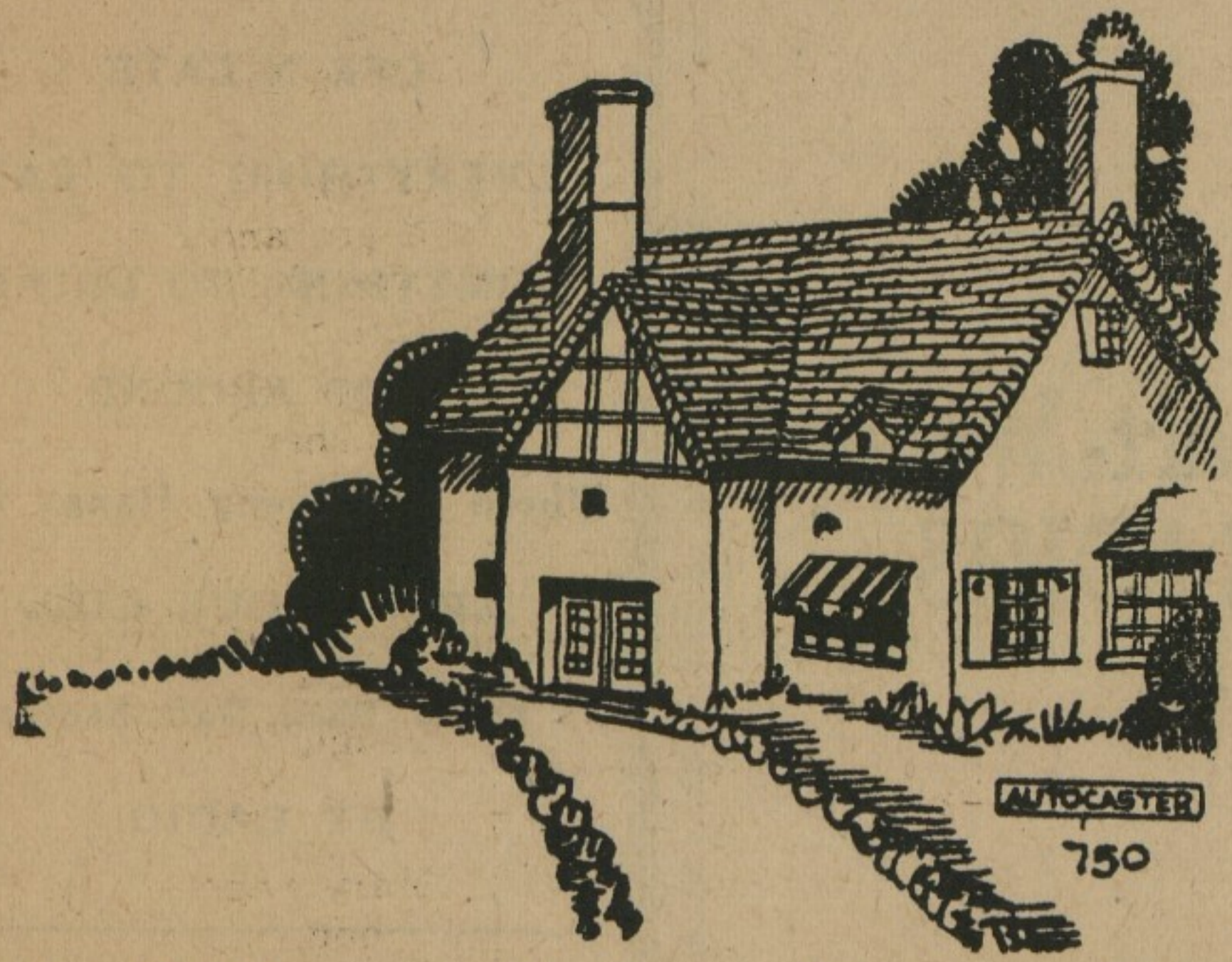

State Department of Health TAKE NO CHANCES—ONLY ONE PREVENTIVE AGAINST BABIES

Commenting on the death that occurred recently in Baltimore from the effects of the bite of a rabid dog Dr. John S. Fulton, Director of the State Department of Health said:

"There is just one preventive against rabies, as the disease which follows injury by a rabid dog is called, and that is the Pasteur treatment.

"The man who died recently did not have the Pasteur treatment. He was bitten by a dog that was acting suspiciously.

"In the thirteen years since the Pasteur treatments were started in Maryland—back in 1898—approximately 1500 people have given the protective treatments against this dreadful disease.

"An unnecessary and preventable death like the one that occurred recently, serves as a terrible warning. The person who is bitten or otherwise injured by a mad animal or by one that is acting suspiciously should apply at once for the Pasteur treatment.

Health Doctor Pleased With County Conditions

Small Number of Cases Of Typhoid Cited As Example

Dr. R. G. Beachley, who succeeded Dr. Joseph P. Franklin here as Deputy State Health Officer for Kent, Queen Annes and Cecil counties, on the departure of Dr. Franklin for his new work in Baltimore, is gratified with results of the health campaign conducted by State Department of Health specialists in a movable health station, which has been touring the country for the past two weeks.

"During the stay of the station, which visited many sections of the county 200 children and babies of pre-school age were given free health examinations and several important clinics were conducted. The truck will return to the county during the week of September 19 to visit those sections it was unable to reach on its first tour.

Dr. Beachley, in commenting on the general health of the people in his district, expressed today satisfaction at the comparatively small number of cases of typhoid fever reported during the year. While other sections of the State have suffered heavily from outbreaks of the disease, the three counties over which he has jurisdiction have been comparatively free of the disease, only five cases having been reported in Kent, six in Cecil and sixteen in Queen Annes since the first of January.

Dr. Beachley attributes this encouraging state of health to the intensive campaigns conducted by the State Department of Health through the medium of the various county health associations.
