State's Forest Fires Less This Year, Indication

Not One Reported So Far This Month, Besley Announces

Forest fires take a greater toll from woodlands in Maryland each year than from any other State in the Appalachian area, a survey by the United States Forest Service revealed today.

Results of the survey, forwarded to Fred W. Besley, State Forester, show that the average forest fire in this State sweeps across 115.6 acres, and that fires last year burned 2.87 per cent of the total area in forests. The State has more than 2,000,000 acres of forest lands.

Although Virginia has a greater average loss from each fire, the percentage of land burned off in Maryland is greater than that in that State, in Pennsylvania or in West Virginia. These are the States listed by the Federal department as the Appalachian area.

Hope for a much better record this year, however, was held out by Mr. Besley. "We can take little pride in the record for 1926," he said, "but since then we have received an increase in funds for our work. Further, we faced intense hazards last year, but the weather has been on our side so far this year. Fires were kept down to a minimum during the spring season, and this month, since the fire season was supposed to open on October 10, we have not had even one fire reported."

Fires in the State last year were \$469,800. Compared with this that in Pennsylvania was \$1,186,321; in Virginia, \$435,710, and in West Virginia, \$24,301.

There were 5,151 forest fires reported in Maryland last year; 2,916 in Pennsylvania; 867 in Virginia, and 462 in West Virginia. There were 91,793 in the United States.
