## ROCK HALL

The Rock Hall band supper Thursday evening was a fine success with a large attendance and a wonderful supper for fifty cents. After it was cleared away the band entertained with a splendid concert that was highly appreciated by the audience. It gave another fine entertainment Saturday evening in T. B. Durling's store room that is now finished and beautifully lighted.

High School pupils have arranged a plate supper for tomorrow evening at their school building. They always prepare for a large crowd.

The new elementary school building seems to have joined the backward class where the Chesapeake Bridge has been so long.

Miss Lillian Brown took her class of boys and girls to see the manufacture of flour at Price's Mill a few days ago. The courteous attendant piloted the party from floor to floor and explained the uses of the various parts of machinery, even running some of it with foot power as it was none of them.

The Rock Hall Board, consisting of the town council, Joseph B. Davis, Mayor, Charles Judefind and Melvin Kendall, and two members of the Rock Hall Progressive Association, G. Ellsworth Leary and Adolph Keller, have employed Kastenker & Anderson, civil engineers and surveyors of Easton, to oversee the construction of the water works system.

This includes a 75 foot tower and 75,000 gallon tank, the construction of which has been awarded to the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Company, of New York City for \$510,000; supplying and installing the pumping equipment to the Baltimore Machine Works for \$624,411; and the installation of mains and appurtenances to the Standard Construction Co., of Baltimore for \$504,750.

Five plugs will be placed at the most advantageous locations and as many as the present amount of funds will cover, the ten thousand dollar bond provided by the town being supplemented by a carnival held once a year ago by the Progressive Association which netted more than two thousand dollars.

The Rock Hall Volunteer Fire Company has laid the foundation and is constructing the cement floor for the new engine house, this work being donated by members of the company. A good foundation for this fund was laid when a carnival last about ten days was held last summer.

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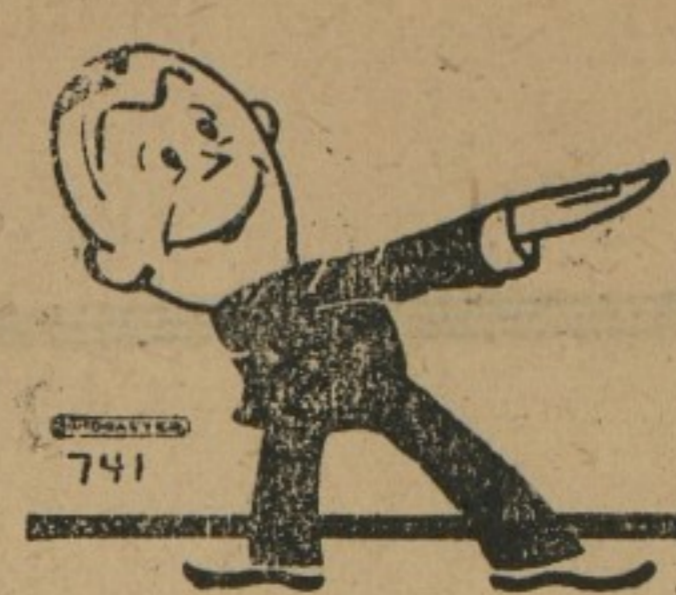
