

Rock Hall Scouts Show Progress In Scouting Works Troop Increases Its Membership

ROCK HALL.—The troop of Boy Scouts of America organized about four months ago under Scout Master Bayard Ayres has made considerable progress in enrollment and Scout work. It now numbers about twenty members and was almost one hundred percent strong at their regular meeting Monday evening in the upper room of the M. E. Church house, where they were given first aid tests and instructions in signaling. They made a fine showing in the Firemen's Parade on the 27th in which they took an active part and they try to do a good turn to someone each day. They heartily acknowledge a debt of gratitude to the troop committee from whom they have received much help and to the chairman, B. T. Durdin. Now let the parents and the people impress upon the boys the true meaning of the Scout Oath and Law, the boys will then sooner measure up to the purpose of the Scout troop which is to make better boys in the community. Boys who join a Scout troop in the right spirit are the Boy Scouts of today and the leaders of tomorrow.

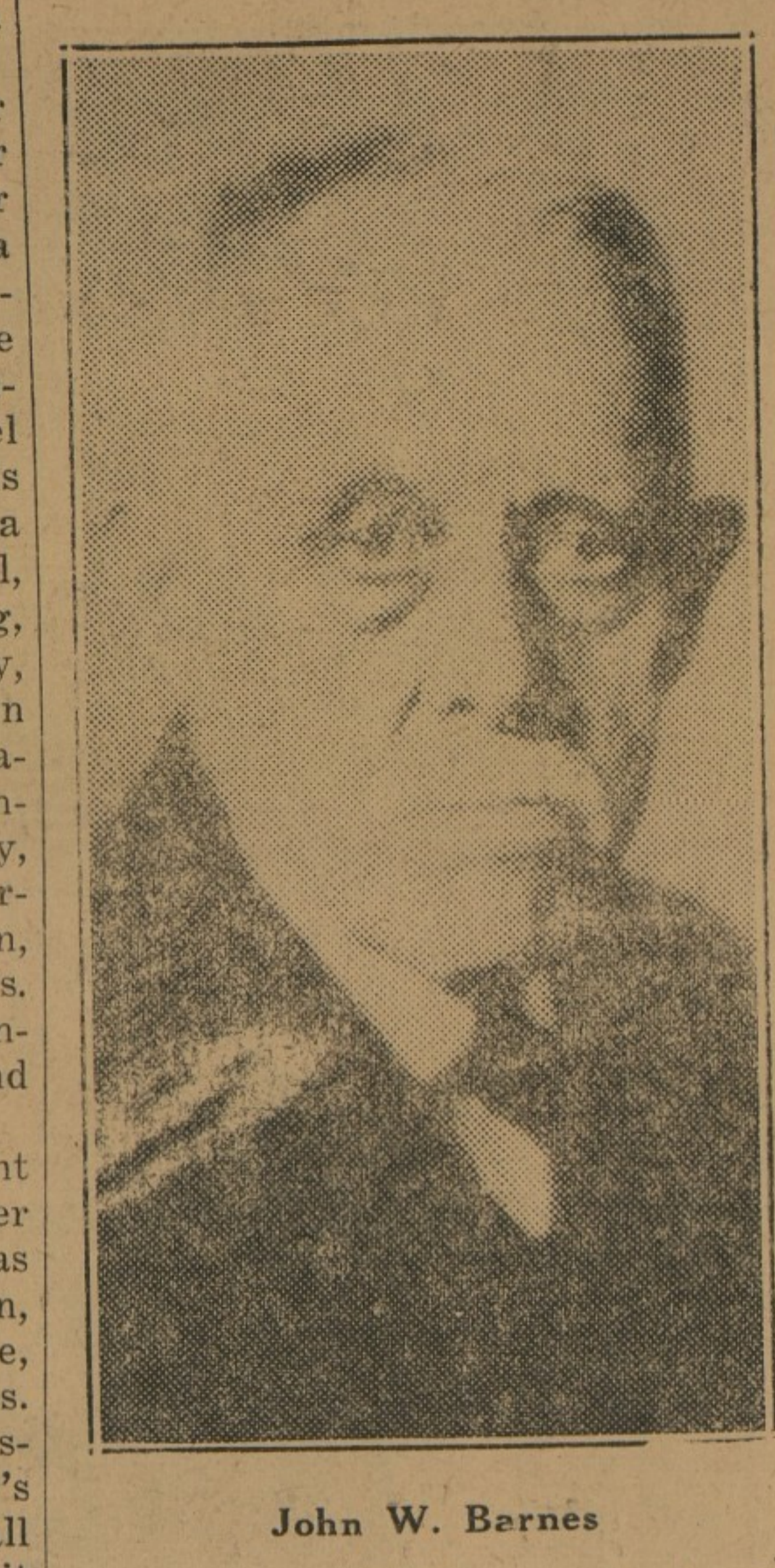
