



**NOTICE TO
Delinquent Tax-Payers**

The Treasurer wishes to call attention to Chapter 261 of the Acts of 1918, providing for the collection of State Taxes.

This Act provides that State Taxes are due the first of July in the year in which they are levied, and if not paid by the first day of October in said year, interest of one half of one per cent shall be charged, if paid at any time during the month of October and interest of one half of one per cent shall be charged for each additional month or fraction thereof that such taxes remain unpaid. Said State Taxes shall be in arrears on and after the first day of January succeeding the date of Levy, AND IT SHALL BE THE DUTY OF SAID COLLECTORS, TREASURERS, AND OTHER OFFICERS WHO MAY BE CHARGED WITH THE COLLECTION OF SAME IMMEDIATELY THEREAFTER TO PROCEED TO COLLECT SAID TAXES IN ARREARS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISION OF THE LAW FOR THE COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT TAXES.

As the Treasurer has no option in this matter, he will proceed to collect all taxes remaining on Tax Books after February 15th, 1919.

HOME WITH WAR HONORS



Lieut. Edgar Boulligny of New Orleans, who returned to the United States the other day on the transport George Washington. Lieutenant Boulligny served with both the French and American armies during the great war. Of French descent, he left New Orleans in the early days of August, 1914, for France, where he enlisted in the Foreign Legion. He served with those famous fighters until May of 1917, when he was transferred to the French aviation service and saw action in Serbia and Albania. Shortly before the signing of the armistice he secured his transfer to the American air service.

Over his left shoulder he wears the Fourager awarded to the Lafayette flying corps, of which he was a member. In addition he won the Croix de Guerre with two palms for gallantry in action. He was wounded three times while fighting with the Foreign Legion, but escaped unhurt through all of his aerial battles.

ALASKA CARES FOR PIONEERS

Territory Provides Home in Former Naval Barracks for Aged Trail Blazers.

Sitka, Alaska.—Alaska's aged and disabled pioneers—men who helped blaze the first trails across the golden northland—always seeking but seldom finding their elusive Eldorado—are cared for at the Alaska Pioneers' home at Sitka, the first capital of the territory. At present there are 65 old "sourdoughs" at the home.

Gov. Thomas Riggs, Jr., of Alaska recently spent several days inspecting the home. He took several meals with the men and talked with both the pioneers and employees.

Buildings used by the home were barracks occupied by the United States marines before 1911. In 1913 the buildings were turned over by the navy department to the department of the interior.

EXCUSE FOR FAKE HOLDUP

St. Louis Man Says He Had to "Stall Wife" on Money Spent for Drinks.

St. Louis.—"I had to hand out some kind of a stall to my wife," said Robert E. Morgan of this city to Detectives Lardner and Kaiser when they questioned him concerning the loss of \$412 which he reported had been taken from him by three armed highwaymen.

"I got married Saturday," he said, "and promised my wife to buy the furniture."

"With \$163 in my pocket I started out. I met several friends and we had some drinks. After paying some bills I found I had just \$35 left for the furniture. And I had to hand out some kind of a stall to my wife. I framed up the holdup and she insisted I report it to the police."

Jefferson City, Mo.—Despondent because Germany lost the war, Henry Sanders, a wealthy bachelor farmer, took his life by jumping from a ferryboat at Bagnell, Mo. He was born in Germany. He repeatedly had sent money back there before this country entered the war, and attempted to do so afterward.

Before he took the plunge he tied a rope around his body and fastened the other end to the boat. It was only necessary to pull in the line to recover the body.

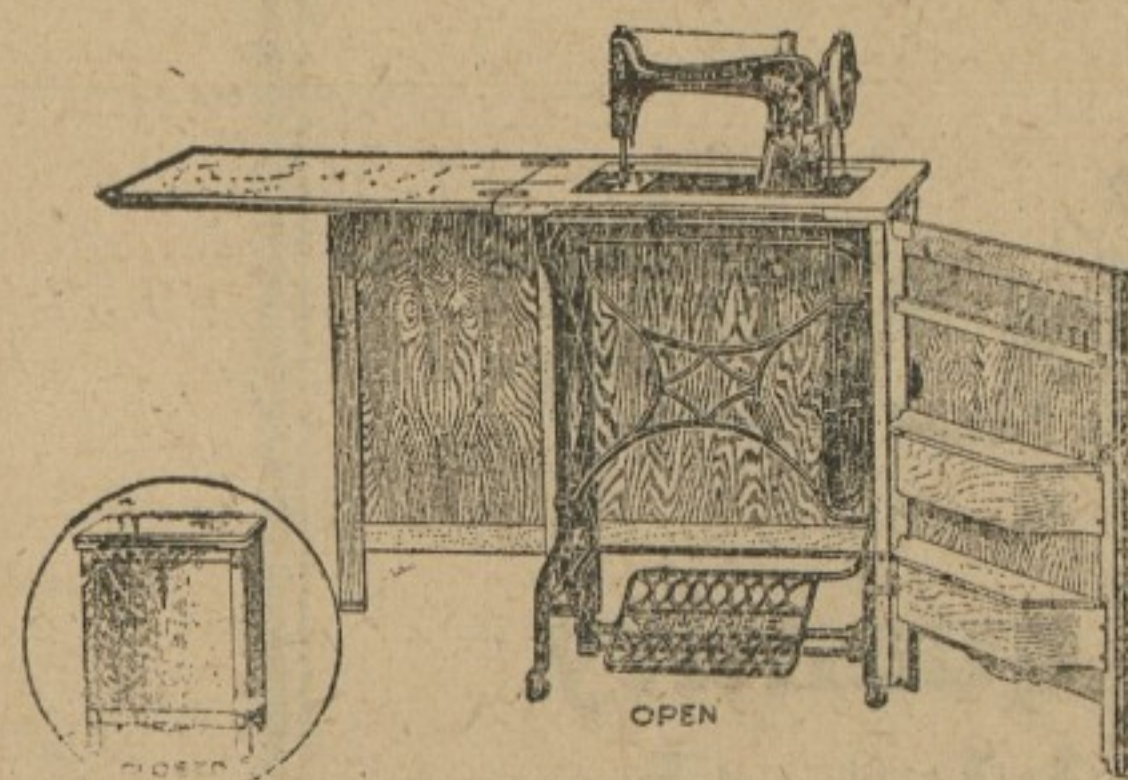
