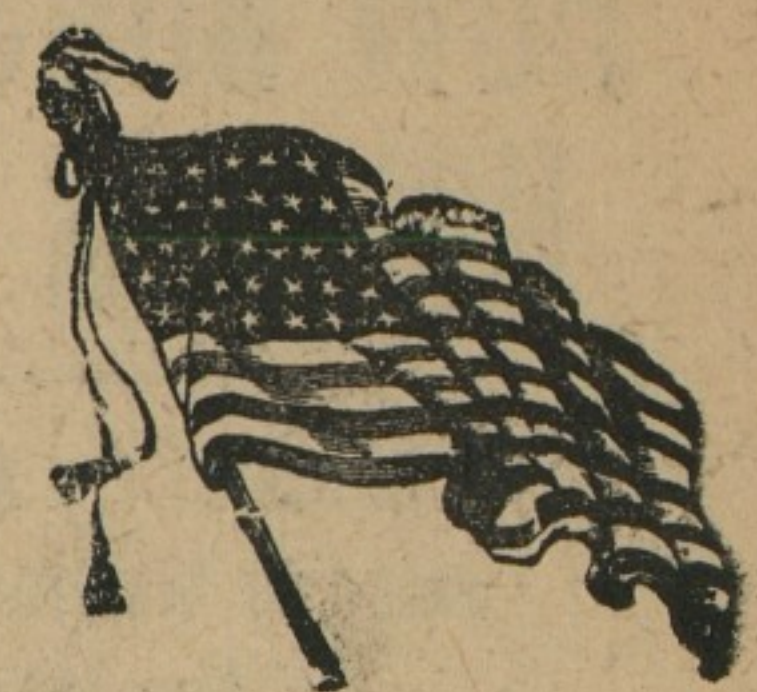

### DRY LAW WILL BE ENFORCED

#### Proposed Regulations To Prevent Illicit Manufacture Of Alcoholic Liquors

After discussion by executive officers of many temperance organizations, gathered in Washington, the following resolutions providing for enforcement of the prohibition amendment were adopted.

Resolved by the national legislative conference, representing twenty-two national and international organizations, devoted to the temperance and prohibition reforms, that the following basic principles should underlie the draft of the proposed code for the enforcement of war-time Prohibition and that the same be and hereby is approved by this body:

1. The appointment of federal law enforcement commissioners with sufficient and adequate power and assistants to secure the enforcement of the act.
2. A provision for the abatement of liquor nuisances by injunction.
3. Conferring of power upon the law enforcement commissioner with the approval of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue to prescribe rules and regulations for the manufacture and distribution of wine for sacramental purposes.
4. Conferring of all necessary authority on officers and assistants to make the necessary arrests for violation of the act.
5. Be it further resolved that in order to make the National Prohibition Amendment effective, the following provisions should underlie the draft of the code for the enforcement:
6. The sale, manufacture, transportation, importation, exportation and possession of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes should be prohibited.
7. All intoxicating liquor illegally possessed, manufactured or sold, and all implements used in the illegal manufacture of such liquors shall be considered contraband.
8. An adequate search and seizure provision, similar to those which have proved effective in the enforcement of prohibitory laws in the States.
9. The sale of all proprietary medicines which are potable or capable of being used as a beverage should be surrounded by the same safeguards as the sale of alcohol.
10. Provisions to prevent any scheme, device or subterfuge to evade the provisions of the act.

### GRANGERS ARE PROGRESSIVE

#### Petition County Commissioners To Build Roads and Enforce Dog Law

In pursuance of action taken at a recent meeting of the Kent County Pomona Grange, the following petitions have been presented to the County Commissioners:

Gentlemen:—  
At a meeting of the Kent County Pomona Grange held at Fairlee, Md. Jan. 18th, 1919, a thorough discussion of the Road question as it pertains to Kent county, resulted in the appointment of a committee composed of the undersigned to secure the active cooperation of the County Commissioners, Road Engineer, Newspapers, and all citizens to secure the following:—

First—The taking over by the state of the road between Still Pond and Betterton, and until this is accomplished the keeping of said road in traveling shape by the county.

Second—The completion of the State Road to Rock Hall calling attention to the serious conditions existing in that section of the county as regards traveling facilities.

Third—The Building of the State Road from Galena to Massey. Said road having been authorized and funds provided for.

To Build Grain Elevator at Kennedyville.

Mr. James G. Metcalfe, well-known local grain buyer, is making arrangements to build, in the near future, a grain elevator at Kennedyville, this county. The building will be of modern design, equipped with every convenience for handling grain expeditiously; and will have a capacity of approximately 20,000 bushels. It will be located on railroad siding with platform scales capable of weighing grain in carload lots.

Kennedyville, already one of the busy centers of the county, will profit materially by the addition of this enterprise, and we doubt not that the farmers of the community will appreciate the advantage inuring to them, and accord Mr. Metcalfe the patronage his spirit of progressive merits. Mr. Metcalfe will continue to maintain an office in Chestertown but will give much of his time and attention to the Kennedyville enterprise after construction of the building contemplated.

Baltimore, Jan. 27.—Webster Rusk, the largest Boy Scout in the world, and said to be the largest man in the United States, died suddenly early yesterday morning from heart failure at Sheesley's Zoo, where he had been on exhibition for the past two weeks. Gentlemen:—  
The undersigned committee in compliance with instructions given them by the Kent County Pomona Grange in session at Fairlee Jan. 18th, 1919, beg leave to present to the County Commissioners and the public the following facts:

1st.—A very good DOG LAW was enacted at the last session of the Legislature.

2nd.—This law as enforced will in another year be a dead letter.

We therefore respectfully recommend that the County Commissioners

1st.—Publish the penalty for violating the law.

2nd.—Instruct the sheriff and constables of the county to arrest all violators of the law.

3rd.—Request all citizens to report the names of all violators of the law.

We would recommend also that, if in compliance with existing laws, all sheriffs and constables be paid a bonus for killing all dogs straying about without licenses.
