Great Exemplar Of The Strenuous Life Passes Away While Asleep

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, who We are the architects that plan and was the twenty-sixth President of the United States, died in his sleep early Monday morning at his home on Sagamore Hill in the village of Oyster Bay, N. Y. He was sixty years old. The immediate cause of death was pulmonary embolism or lodgment in the lung of a clot from a broken vein. This announcement was made by W. Emlen Roosevelt, quoting Dr.
