SEALED PROPOSALS for building two sections of State Highway, as follows:

Kent County, Contract No. K-49. One section of State Highway along the Locust Grove-Black Station Road, a distance of 1.58 miles, and along the road from the Still Pond Road to Coleman, a distance of 0.88 miles, making a total distance of 2.46 miles (concrete with slag shoulders.)
