### ORDER OF PUBLICATION

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT FOR KENT COUNTY IN EQUITY NO. 2602

EILEEN ZIEGLER vs. JOSEPH ZIEGLER

The object of the Bill filed in the above entitled case is to procure a Decree for divorce *vinculo matrimonii* for the Plaintiff, a resident of Kent County, Maryland, from the Defendant, a non-resident of the State of Maryland.

The Bill states: 1. That on the 14th day of June, 1923, she, Eileen Ziegler, was married to her husband, Joseph Ziegler, with whom she resided in the City of Wilmington, State of Delaware, until the 26th day of December, 1925.

2. 3. That your Oratrix has resided in Chestertown, Kent County, Maryland, for more than two years next preceding the filing of this application.

4. That your Oratrix and the said Defendant, Joseph Ziegler, have had no children born to them from said marriage.

5. That the said Defendant, Joseph Ziegler, is a non-resident of the State of Maryland, and is now residing, to the best of your Oratrix's knowledge and information, in the City of Wilmington, State of Delaware, and whose present address is 914 West 2nd Street.

It is thereupon, this 29th day of January, 1930, ordered by the Circuit Court for Kent County, in Equity, that the Plaintiff, by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in said Kent County, once in each of four successive weeks before the 27th day of February next, give notice to the said Joseph Ziegler, non-resident Defendant, warning him to appear in this Court in person, or by Solicitor, on or before the 14th day of March next, to show cause, if any he has, why a Decree ought not to be passed as prayer.
