While Alexander kept the net smoking and the crowd yelling Stevens was playing a whale of a game in the defensive, getting the ball off the boards and giving his teammates a running start by controlling the ball from center.

The game started off in the common place manner. Washington went away in the lead and increased the margin to ten points. Then Giraitis and Reamer began their duel with the result that three personals were marked up against the Washington luminary.

When the second period started Giraitis was back in the lineup but his stay was short. He soon committed the fourth and final foul and was done for the evening.

The large crowd which attended the game despite the inclement weather was treated to an exciting contest which, however, was not exceptional in the calibre of basketball display.

For the visitors Kramer and Elliott played well. The former's work suffered somewhat when he was shifted to center where he was dwarfed by the six foot five Stevens.

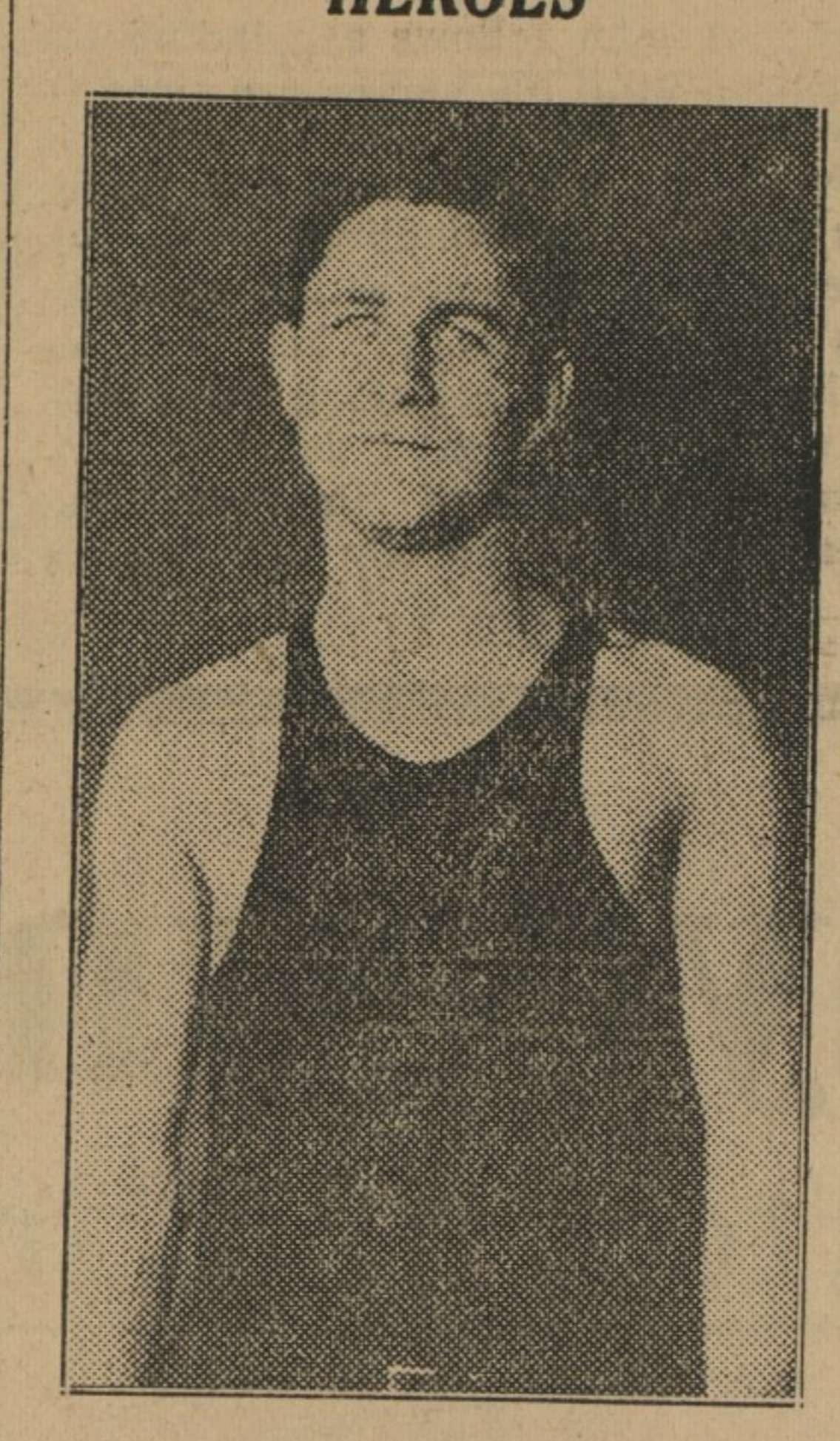
