The latest test shows five cubic feet of acetylene gas burned one hour equals 280 candle-power, or fifty-six candle-power per cubic foot. Five cubic feet of ordinary gas gives from sixteen to twenty DRY 60000 and SHOES. candle-power. Taking the latter figure, there would be one cubic foot of acetylene at fifty candle-power to 12 1-2 feet of ordinary gas. Therefore, it would take 12,500 feet of ordinary gas to give MEN'S, WOMEN'S and CHILDREN'S SHOES the same illumination as 1,000 feet of

acetylene gas.
