OYSTER SEASON AT HAND!

Protection of Maryland Oyster Beds Entrusted to a Republican Navy for the First Time Since Its Organization — Laws Gov= erning Dredging and Tonging and Which Otherwise Affect the Industry — Penaltles for Violations — Vessels and Officers of the Force.

The following timely article is from the Baltimore American of last Saturday. The oyster grounds are divided into seven districts. This district is known as the first, and includes Kent and Queen Anne's, with one vessel, the Anna B. Smith, Capt. James F. Stevens:

The active operations of the Maryland State Fishery Force began Sept. 1, and for the first time since the inauguration of the armed guard boat system, in 1867, the protection of the oyster beds of Maryland is entrusted to a Republican oyster navy. Commanner E. S. Turner has command of a well-equipped fleet of boats, and the season will give opportunity to the members of the force to show their skill and ability in defence of the oyster bars. 




