Coming Conference.

There is being a lively contest waged for this honor from the Wilmington Conference, but the opinion of the most prominent of the members appears to be that Lieutenant-Governor I. Thomas Parker and John P. Holland, of Milford, will be the ones chosen. The latter by his activity in the recent Local Option campaign in Delaware became known from one end of the state to the other and now his taking part in the fight in Worcester county, Maryland, will give him undoubtedly a foothold with the delegates from that section.

The matter of equal lay representation in the General Conference with the ministerial delegates, which was agitated by a few persons sometime ago appears to have been forgotten. It was never regarded seriously by the more prominent members of the conference, being in their opinion only a repetition of what has been brought up almost every year for a long time.

WATER NOTES.

Engineer Quick was in town Monday and made another thorough investigation of the Chestertown Water Co.'s plant under the direction of the special committee. The Company did all in their power to facilitate the work of the committee but again impressed upon them that they were not seeking a sale. Engineer Quick, we learn, has sent his report to the committee in which he puts the value of the raw materials, exclusive of franchise, good will and water supply at \$20,100. By notice elsewhere another test is announced for Tuesday.

An important notice is published relative to the testing of water mains next Tuesday. The citizens should bear it in mind.

A test of five hose pressure and force was witnessed last Thursday by a number of the town officials. With the reservoir valve closed and fifty pounds pressure at the pump house the hose easily threw a stream above the Voshell House roof and over the top of Mr. Harry Cannon's dwelling in the highest section up town. The hose nozzle used was five-eight and 1/2 inch. The test was very gratifying to all concerned.

The Volunteer Fire Company have obtained temporary quarters in the room adjoining the office of T. W. Elison, Esq., through the latter's generosity, and will meet at the above room next Monday night.

Big Suit.—John D. Urie and H. H. Barroll, Esqs., are the opposing counsel in a case involving large amounts. Mr. Barroll as attorney for Daniel O'Reardon, of Boston, Mass., against Charles O. Burns, Charles O. Burns trading as C. O. Burns Co., and C. O. Burns Company, a corporation, obtained an attachment for \$41,893. This amount is claimed by Mr. O'Reardon from the defendants consisting of "Old Field Point" or the Resin farm near Galena. Mr. Burns is alleged to own or control the C. O. Burns Co., a wealthy corporation in New York, which sells miniature savings banks and solicits savings deposits for national and other banks.

The defendant, Mr. Burns, in an interview with the News man states that the plaintiff, O'Reardon, was formerly in his employ and was discharged in December for incompetency. At this time Mr. Burns is foreclosing a mortgage on his wife's property near Annapolis, which was a mortgage for the entire purchase price of the property. Afterwards Mr. Burns advanced money to improve the property and to compromise the mortgage now endeavoring to repudiate these amounts advanced, stating that the mortgage only covered the purchase price. Mr. B. is foreclosing the mortgage and suing for the difference. O'Reardon's attorney in Baltimore, has attempted to compromise the mortgage business at Annapolis but it was refused unless the suit above mentioned was dismissed.

Mr. Burns thinks it a spite case as he has not had a personal transaction with O'Reardon in ten years. The New York business he says, has nothing to do with the affairs of C. O. Burns. The C. O. Burns Co. have O'Reardon's notes for nearly \$5,000 and he is charged with over \$11,000.

A paper was sent to the C. O. Burns Co. 4 bankers in New York, which Mr. Burns says was done endeavoring to damage their credit.

Wills Probated.—The will of the late Richard T. Turner, Jr., of Betterton, was filed in the Orphan's Court of Kent county on Tuesday last. It wills all his property to the widow Martha E. Turner during her life and at her death to the children, Howard, Henry C., Jas. E. Wm. W., R. S., and J. Archer. Messrs. Howard, Henry C. and Jas. E. Turner are named as executors. The will was dated Feb. 7, 1906 and is witnessed by Miss M. Kate Crew and Mr. Arthur H. Price.

The will of the late F. Burton Warren was filed for probate and letters upon the estate were granted to A. M. Kendall, Esq., of Fairlee.

Electrical Notes.—The Chestertown Electric Light plant is installing new engine, new dynamo and fixtures to their plant here. Extra lights are to be erected near Chester cemetery and at other places in town.

The Centerville town commissioners have contracted with the Centerville Light, Heat & Power Company to burn water at the water works for \$1800 per year.

A large motor has also been placed in the Centerville Flour Mills, Carter & Co., proprietors. Current was turned on at that place Thursday afternoon.
