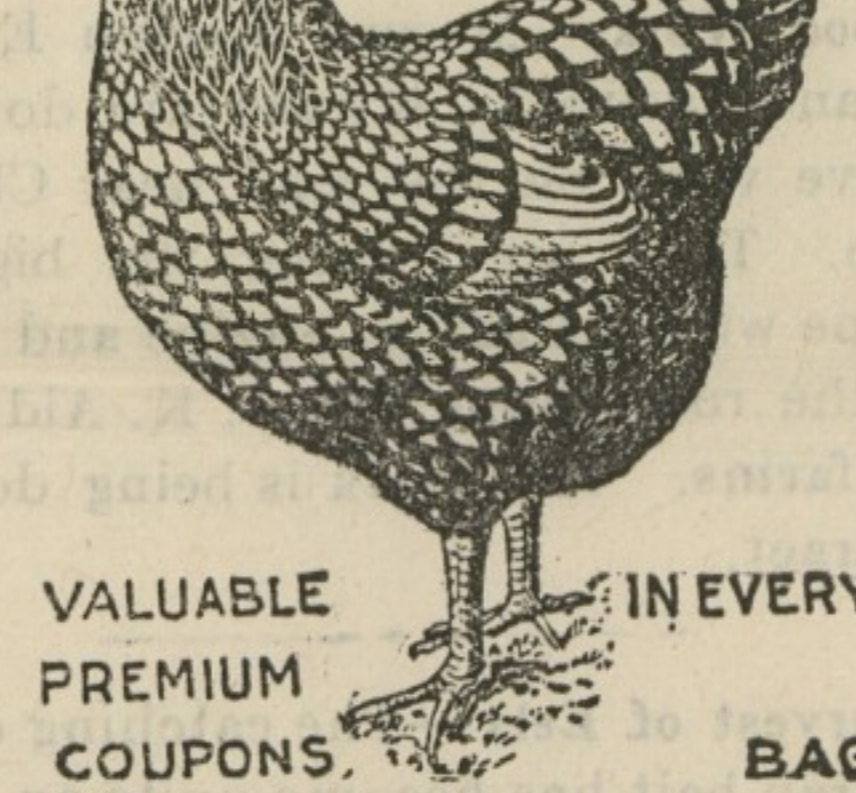

FERRY ON MONDAY.

The Commissioners of Kent and Queen Anne's counties have decided to start the ferry across Chester river Monday when work on the bridge will be commenced. This ferry will be in command of Messrs. Edward Armstrong, of Kent, and Wm. Coleman, of Queen Anne's, and other helpers. The hours will be from 5:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m. Dyer Bros. have erected piers on either side of the river so that the tides will not likely interfere with travel. Travel will probably be suspended for at least a month.

TAX RATE DECLARED.

No Raise in Rate—County Expenses Heavy Past Year—Schools Allowed \$30,000.

The Kent County Commissioners at the regular meeting on Tuesday made the annual tax levy on county taxes for 1908, fixing the rate at \$1.12 on the \$100, thus making the State and county rate the same as last year, \$1.28 on each \$100.

The Commissioners are to be congratulated and commended by every good citizen and tax-payer on being able to keep the rate at \$1.12 in the face of so many increased expenses in several items of the levy. It shows careful business-like and economical methods in that office have prevailed since it came under present control.

The Commissioners have increased the levy for the public schools by \$5,000. The additional amount was required by a law passed by the last Legislature and shown to be necessary by a careful statement made to the Board by Prof. Melvin, Secretary and Treasurer of the County School Board. The total amount levied for school next year is \$30,000.

The towns throughout Kent have been incorporated and call for extra appropriations, court expenses have been heavy, election expenses greater than ever, and in some places permanent roads have been built. The cash levy has also been increased. To do all this without an increased tax rate speaks highly for the administration of the county commissioners' office by officials of the right stamp and faithful to the interests of all their constituents.

Green Hill Sold.—W. W. Beck, assignee, sold at public sale Tuesday the Handy farm, also known as "Green Hill." Mr. Albert Jervis, of Still Pond, was the purchaser at \$8,500. The farm contains 300 acres, is located on Chesapeake Bay and was held by a Land Improvement Company under the management of Herbert Stimpson, Esq., of Baltimore. It is now tenanted by Mr. Lohr.

Mr. Joseph Everett has purchased the Faithful farm near Chester bridge for \$7,000. It contains 130 acres and is tenanted by Mr. Weller. It adjoins Mr. J. T. Anthony's place.

WHAT INDIVIDUALS CAN DO. The tax-payers of Kent should not sit down and wait for the State to build the roads. The citizens of Massey's have set an example which other sections might well imitate. Under the leadership of Hon. Isaac Gibbs and Commissioner C. B. Dudley they have built a mile and a half of fine gravel road two feet thick and twelve feet wide. The gravel bank cost \$50 and teams were loaned by farmers adjacent. The whole road cost less than \$300 and it is said to be equal to a pile of "Good for Massey's. Why can't Betterton, Buck Neck, Tolchester or Rock Hall do the same?"

Accidents.—Mrs. George W. Usilton's little son, George, was killed by a colt of H. K. Reed's a few days ago and was senseless for a while but is now very much improved.
