WHERE THEY PICK UP FISH

MIRACLE WHEAT. It Grows Five Feet Tall, Large Straw and Produced 56 Bushels Per Acre.

At the close of the rebellion, Mr. K. B. Stoner, of Fincastle, Va., quartermaster in Lee's army, returned home with no means of support. Being a man of strong religious convictions he daily prayed to God to point out him a way to place his family beyond want.

Mr. Stoner sold his rights to this wheat to the McCormick Wheat Co., from which he derived a comfortable fortune. The ability to produce a large number of heads seems to be due to its remarkable tendency to stool out, some stools having 125 stalks from one seed. It is sown two pecks per acre, in rows twelve inches apart and yields from 66 to 76 bushels per acre, and that too, under the same field conditions of soil and culture as the native varieties, which yield only 10 to 16 bushels per acre.

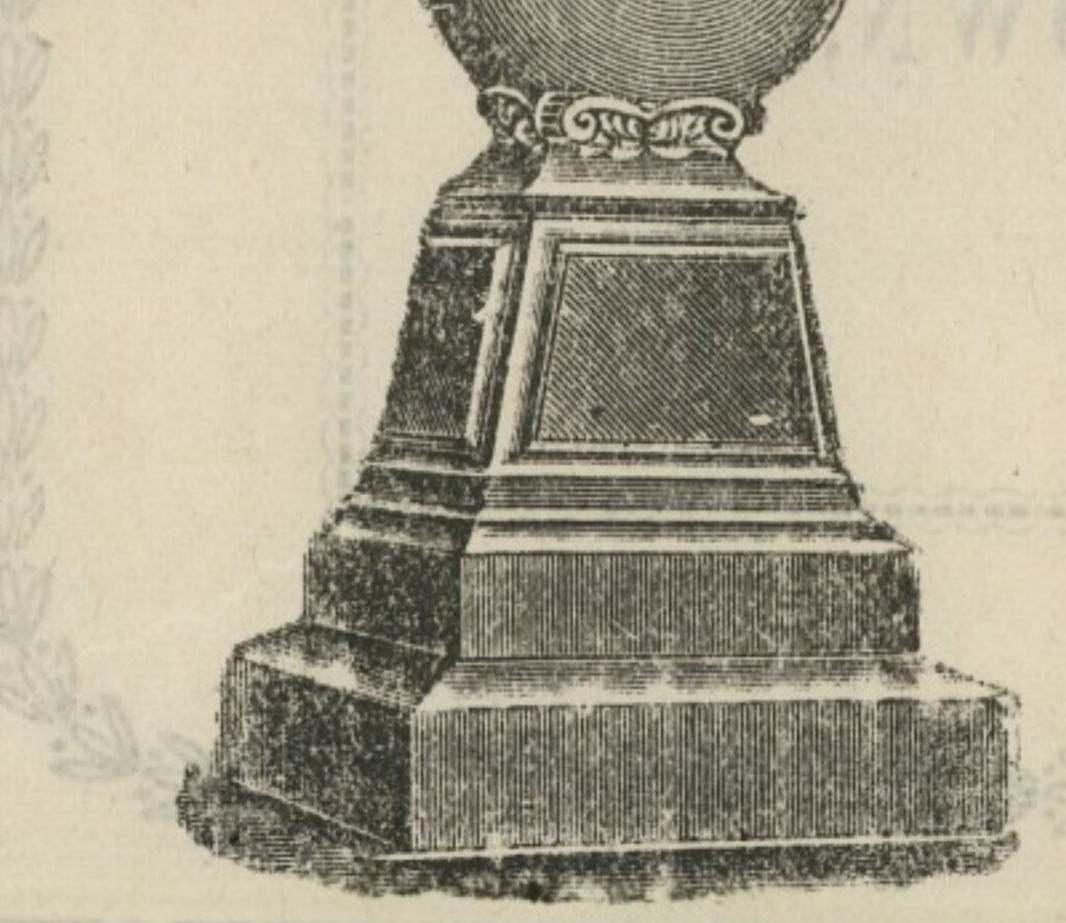
