COURT NOTES.

Horace Hyson Sentenced by Chief Judge Pearce—Court Adjourned to Dec. 7—Grinnell Rearrested.

Chief Judge James A. Pearce presided at a special session of Court Wednesday Horace Hyson, who was convicted of the murder of James E. Walmsley, was sentenced to 18 years in the penitentiary, this being the limit. Horace was very much effected and insisted that he was innocent of this crime. "It's a shame, said he, 'to send me away. I don't know anything more about that old man's death than you!" Court then adjourned to December 7th.

Sheriff Hadaway and Deputy Frank Lockerman re-arrested Charles H. Grinnell at Rock Hill, last Saturday night on the charge of carrying concealed weapons. This is the negro who was tried last week on the charge of murdering Frank Harvey at Rock Hill and released. The hearing was held before Justice Medders on Monday who sentenced him to the house of Correction for two years. In sentencing the prisoner the justice advised him to stay away from Kent after his term expired. The evidence showed that Grinnell upon his arrival in Rock Hill bought a box of cartridges and had made threats about what he intended to do.

The case of Mrs. Sarah J. Jenkins vs. William J. Mason, of Rutburg, Queen Anne's County, which was set for trial at the present term of the Circuit Court for Kent county, has been settled, the defendant paying \$1000 and all costs.

An Awful Experience.—Mr. I. R. Leaverton, one of Kent's most prominent and influential citizens, had an awful experience and narrow escape from death on Monday last. While driving a spirited team of horses down the hill at Tolchester beach both animals became unmanageable and ran wildly out on the long pier. When at the very end of the pier the vehicle collided with one of the hand cars used for conveying freight. Both horses were thrown and the vehicle upset. This saved all—the horses, vehicle and driver from dashing off the end of the pier into the bay. Mr. Leaverton was thrown with great force against a guard rail or fence and sustained painful bruises, but is not complaining being happy and thankful that he escaped drowning. It was a narrow escape and a thrilling sight to the helpless onlookers.

DEMOCRATS VICTORIOUS IN MARYLAND.

Eastern Shore Gives Covington Nearly 3,000 Majority Over Jackson—But One County for Jackson—Mudd and Pearce Get Small Majorities.

A special to the News from the Baltimore Evening News at 3 p. m., yesterday says:

"The returns from Maryland are in sufficient for us to state that Bryan will have SIX electors and Taft one, with the other elector in doubt."

The Sun evidently had an opposite effect on the Eastern Shore than it hoped for as the counties gave Congressman Covington nearly 3,000 majority over Jackson; Talbot gets 2,500 over Garret; Gill 1800 over his opponent, while Mudd only gets it by 400 majority and Pearce by 600. The rock-ribbed Republican counties of Dorchester and Allegany each give Democratic majorities.

Maryland in 1896 went against Bryan by 32,000; in 1900 the State gave Roosevelt 14,000 and this year Bryan gets a small majority. It is certainly a great victory for the Democracy.
