PREMIUMS AT CROP EXHIBIT

At a meeting of the directors of the Maryland Cereal and Forage Crop Breeders' Association at the Hotel Renwick, Baltimore, Tuesday afternoon, it was decided to announce the following premiums to be competed for at the Fifth Regiment Armory, December 1, 2 and 3:

For corn and wheat exhibits the State is divided into three divisions—Eastern Shore, Western and Southern Maryland—the same classes and premiums applying to each of the divisions.

Class A—For the best peck of white corn, \$10; second, \$5; third, \$3; fourth, \$3.
Class B—For the best 10 ears of yellow corn, \$10; second, \$5; third, \$3; fourth, \$2.

Class C—For the best peck of Fultz wheat, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.
Class D—For the best peck of Dietz wheat, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.

Class E—For the best peck of Currell wheat, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.
Class F—For the best peck of rye, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.

Class G—For the best peck of crimson clover, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$3.
Class H—For the best peck of barley, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.

Class I—For the best peck of red clover, \$5; second, \$3; third, \$2.
Class K—For the best peck of New Era, black and whippoorwill cowpeas, each \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.

Class L—For the best bushel of buckwheat, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.
Class M—For the best sheaf of timothy hay, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.

Class N—For the best sheaf of red clover hay, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.
Class O—For the best sheaf of alfalfa hay, \$3; second, \$2; third, \$1.

For the best 10 ears of corn in the show the Belgian loving cup, contributed by J. Bolgino & Son, seed-men, Baltimore.

For the best peck of wheat in the show, a No. 120 Iron Age riding cultivator, valued at \$32; contributed by the Baltimore Manufacturing Company, Greenloch, New Jersey.

For the best sheaf of timothy hay in the show, a riding bridle, contributed by "Little Joe" Wiesenfeld, Baltimore.

For the best sheaf of clover hay in the show, a Caboon seeder, contributed by Griffin & Turner Company, Baltimore.

For the best 10 ears of corn in the show grown in Kent county, a silver fruit stand, valued at \$5; contributed by J. H. Sides, Chestertown, Maryland.

Second best, a black mesaline waist pattern, valued at \$3; contributed by A. L. Sparks, Chestertown. Third best, a Glover (guaranteed) razor, valued at \$2; contributed by H. R. Graham & Bro., Chestertown.

For the best 10 ears of corn in the show grown in Frederick county, a handsome china salad bowl; contributed by Smith and Dertzbaugh, Frederick, Maryland.

For the best 10 ears of corn grown from pedigree seed gotten from W. Irving Walker in 1908, a Shamber Bros. cornetter, valued at \$32. Second best, a registered English Berkshire boar pig, corn March 27, valued at \$30. Third best, a registered English Berkshire sow pig, born April 5, valued at \$20—all contributed by W. Irving Walker.

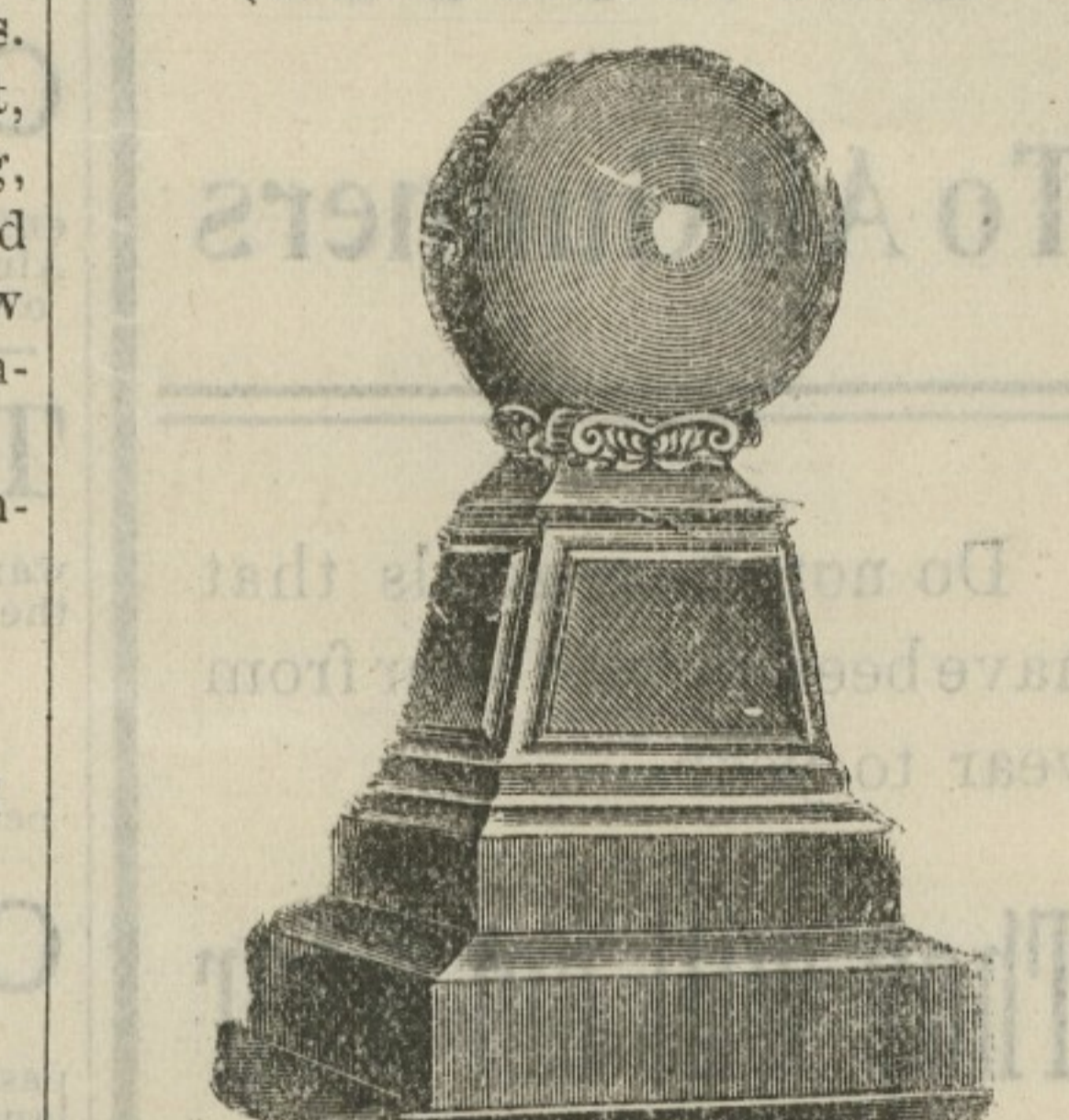
