

CORNER STONE LAYING.
The corner stone of the new Municipal Building for Chestertown will be laid on Thursday afternoon, Jan. 7, 1909, at 3:15 o'clock. The exercises will be in charge of Chester Lodge, No. 118, A. F. & A. M. This will be the first building in this section ever dedicated by the Masonic fraternity and it should be a very interesting occasion.

BROWN & MORRIS MILL BURNED.
The grist mill known as Connelly's mill, near St. Paul's church, was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night. The fire was first seen by Mr. Conly Beauchamp, who lives in the mill house, coming from the engine room. This mill was rebuilt by Price & Topping fifteen years ago and sold by them to Harry W. Moore who in turn sold to John E. Morris and Charles M. Brown. The gates gave away soon after the purchase and the mill remained idle until last year when a new engine was installed and P. D. Allen took hold of it and was in charge at time of fire. The loss will be about \$7,000 with only \$1250 insurance in J. G. Beck's agency. Mr. Sam Maslin had 75 bushels of corn in the mill.

CAPT. WOODALL ATTACKED.
George and Michael Cohee Go To Their Home and Set It On Fire—George Is Badly Burned.

Too much celebrating caused trouble for George and Michael Cohee, of Fredericktown, on Christmas eve. They assaulted Capt. James E. Woodall, but were stopped by bystanders before he was injured seriously. They then sought refuge in their house and a short time later the house was seen to be on fire, and was entirely destroyed. The Cohees were gotten out of the building by neighbors, but George was so badly burned that he had to be sent to a hospital.

Mr. Frank Jester will occupy the LeCompt residence near St. Paul's church and expects to entertain boarders this summer.

Among the recent changes in Chestertown are these: Tylden Hadaway takes the Roland house on High street and Marshall Pinkard removes to the house on Queen street vacated by Mr. H. M. Starford, who has bought the tenable occupied by C. H.
