


COURT CASES.

The Appeal Docket Occupies Several Days--Criminal Cases--Damage Suits, &c.

The appeal case of Simon Grollman vs. James Willis was tried and judgment given for Grollman. S. S. Beck for Grollman.

The case of Simon Westcott vs. Smith Premier Typewriting Co., was a claim of \$65 for commissions on machine, etc., sold Kent County School Board. The jury returned a verdict for Simon for the full amount of claim. L. W. Wickes and W. W. Beck for Mr. Westcott and H. H. Barroll for defendant.

Alvah A. Lamkin, attorney for Bessie A. Stahng, petitioned the court for a writ of habeas corpus to secure the custody of an 8-year-old negro boy from Mr. and Mrs. Wm. H. Wallis. The court granted the petition, but when the mother and Supt. Wm. Ford tried to take the boy from Mrs. Wallis, who had been so good to him, he kicked and cried and refused to budge. He was carried away by force.

Robert J. McWhorter sold the lively stable cross street now occupied by Charles H. Davis, to Mr. Stafford, but the occupant refused to move. A hearing was had before Justice Fowler in January, who decided that Mr. Davis should have had six months notice. The case was appealed to court, where it was proven that Mr. Davis had only been the tenant of Mr. McWhorter for one year, therefore only a month's notice was required. The jury returned a verdict for plaintiff for restitution of property. L. W. Wickes for McWhorter, H. H. Barroll for Davis.

The case of John R. Howell vs. Sam'l Moffett, for \$10 horse service fee, was tried by jury and a verdict given for Moffett. H. H. Barroll for Moffett, W. W. Beck for Howell. State vs. Oscar Johnson, for assault on George Deen. Motion to dismiss for want of jurisdiction of the justice was granted and the prisoner discharged. He was afterwards re-arrested on another writ. S. S. Beck for prisoner, W. W. Beck for State.

State vs. Nellie Mitchell, for swearing. Motion to squash proceedings granted. S. P. Townsend for Mitchell, W. W. Beck for State. State vs. John Evans, for vagrancy. Tried by jury and verdict not guilty. J. deK. Smith for Evans, W. W. Beck for State. John A. Walls vs. W. Holt Woodall. This was a case in which Mr. Woodall purchased a horse of Mr. Walls guaranteed to be sound, &c. The jury returned a verdict for Mr. Walls for \$100. W. W. Beck for Woodall, H. H. Barroll for Walls.

The Grand Jury returned indictments against Wm. Palmer, Theodore Butler, John Russell, Wesley Blake, Alonzo Brooks, Earl Gibbs, Benj. Comgys, all for larceny; Samuel Ann, J. H. Jones, Samuel Mason, Henry and Augusta Mercer, Junius Smith, all for violating local option law; Jos. Jones, illegal use horse and buggy; Robert Clayton, for selling stolen goods; Noah Walker, receiving stolen goods.

All day Thursday was occupied with the suit of Dr. S. E. Ford against Mrs. Mary L. Baker, Mrs. J. C. Davis and Mrs. Annie Hayes Harper for payment for bath room fixtures. The jury brought in a verdict for Dr. Ford for \$11 as against Mrs. Baker. Dr. Ford was represented by H. H. Barroll; Mrs. Baker by Herbert Perkins; Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Baker by J. D. Eric.

The case of Chas. Brown and wife vs. Kent county for damages resulting from an accident due to a charge from horses taking fright at a load of sand left near roadside near St. Paul's Church, was on trial at time of going to press. Marion deK. Smith represented plaintiff and Lewin W. Wickes defendant.

The Grand Jury finished their labors Thursday and reported that they had been in session for 90 days, examined 90 witnesses, 7 constables and bailiffs, made 18 presentations and found 18 true bills. They further reported that they had been delayed in proceedings because of the non-attendance of witnesses for whom summonses were issued. The jail and premises were found neat and clean and comfortably provided for the prisoners. The removal of James Blake from the jail at time of going to press. Matter of sickness and infirmities was advised. Thanks to the court and officers of the court for their kind attention to the Grand Jury.

ORPHAN'S COURT NEWS. Letters testamentary upon the estate of Mrs. Celeno V. Newman were granted to Thomas A. Murray who presented her bond for \$5,000 to cover inheritance tax) and Charles L. Dodd and Thomas D. Bowers were appointed to appraise the estate. It is estimated that her estate will amount to \$17,000.

Letters testamentary upon the estate of Mary E. Perkins were granted to her four sons, George and Clarence W. Eben, F. Ann Thomas W. Perkins, who presented their bond for \$20,000 and Lewin W. Wickes and Wm. H. Beck were appointed to appraise said estate. The will bequeaths the property as follows: one-fifth to each of sons, George, Eben, Clarence and Thomas, and remaining one-fifth to be held in trust for the rents, etc., to be paid to Caroline Perkins, widow of Charles, during her life or so long as she remains unmarried; and upon her decease or re-marriage said portion is to be divided equally among sons. The will was made March 10, 1904, and witnessed by Lewin W. Wickes and Wm. H. Beck.

Letters testamentary upon estate of George W. Hatcherson were granted to Sarah E. Hatcherson who presented her bond for \$5,000 and Chas. L. Dodd and Walter T. Morris were appointed appraisers.
