KENT OPOSSUM IN WEST.

Millionaire Oil Man, Brother to Col. Sam'l L. Wright, of Kent, Gives Feast to Friends.

The California Chronicle published in San Rafael under date of April 20th, says:

"At the annual luncheon given a few days ago by John M. Wright, millionaire oil man, at his mountain home, Ridgecrest, to Constantine de Silis, said to be one of the oldest residents of Marin county, 'possum,' specially imported by Wright from Maryland, figured in bill of fare.

"De Silis, who is a Greek by birth, is well known as being one-time keeper for years of the inn near the summit of Bolinas ridge, close by the spot where Wright's mountain home now stands. Though 87 years of age, leading the simple life has left him a well-preserved man. His appearance suggests dignity, distinction and force and is reminiscent of the descriptions of some classical hero.

"De Silis ate his share of the luncheon heartily and enjoyed the 'possum' as much as any of the present. Among those were D. G. Scofield, vice-president of the Standard Oil Co.; Earl L. Scofield, his son, and G. L. Danby, a member of the office staff; George T. Ruddock and A. F. Hollansbee."

The 'possum was caught in Kent county and expressed by Col. Samuel L. Wright to his brother in California. The expressage came to \$3.25. All present voted that the Kent county 'possum' was in a class by himself among delicious eatables.
