Political Notes.

The Organization forces won in the recent primaries in Dorchester and Prince George's Senator John Walter Smith's friend Judge Jones, and Mr. Pattison, will go on the ticket for judge while Dr. Wells, of Prince George's and Mr. Harrington of Dorchester will be candidates for Senate.

Ticket For Queen Anne's. Centreville, Md., Aug. 1.—The Democratic primaries held in Queen Anne's county yesterday brought out about 1,400 votes. The most exciting contest was for nominations of the house of Delegates. Frank H. Phillip, John T. Roe and Samuel Roe won, defeating Charles W. Butler, John F. Godwin and Dudley G. Roe.

For Sheriff, W. F. Delahay was the winner in a triangular fight. For County Commissioner, there were contests in the Third and Fifth districts. William G. Roe won in the Third over John F. Terry. In the Fifth J. H. Carter was defeated by James Rhodes.

The full list nominated is as follows: G. John Merrick, First district; A. C. Newman, Second; William G. Roe, Third; W. H. H. Hopkins, Fourth; James Rhodes, Fifth; Charles W. Legar, Sixth; and H. Clay Hendrix, Seventh. For Surveyor, S. Chester Coursey, was nominated without opposition.

Messrs. John G. George, J. E. Kirwin and J. K. Brown were elected members of the State Central Committee.

CLOSE CALL FOR A CHILD.

Edgar Davis Lusby, aged 10 years, son of James Lusby, residing on "The Village Farm," near Cecilton, came near suffocating last Tuesday in a peculiar manner. Mr. Lusby and men were fanning wheat with the fan on the lower floor of the barn. The wheat was fed to the fan through a small chute from the garner on the second floor. Edgar and the other children were in the habit of playing in the garner of wheat whenever the fan was running.

Tuesday afternoon while the children were taking their usual afternoon nap, Edgar gave them the slip and went to the barn and got in the wheat without any of the men knowing he was there. The usual practice for the children was to let their feet and legs run down the chute with the wheat until they touched the bottom of the chute and then draw them out again. This was a fair game and was deeper than he thought, and before he was touched the bottom he was buried in the wheat.

He realized his dangerous position before he was completely covered and called with all the power he had left for some one to come and get him and pull him out. His cries were heard by his mother and another man in the house both ran to the barn and notified Mr. Lusby that some one was in distress up in the loft. The fan was stopped, and the peculiar and distressing noise made by the boy directed them to the floor where he was buried. With the heroic efforts of all hands and by knocking the boards away from the garner entrance they managed to get the wheat from his head and face in time to save the little fellow's life. After being revived the only effect of the accident was a severe hoarseness of the throat. In speaking of the affair later he said, "I'll never NEVER do that again; I NEVER will!"

STOCK DYING.

An epidemic has begun among the horses of the farmers near Milford, Del., and the best veterinary surgeons have so far failed to find any medicine that helps. The symptoms are that the animal cannot swallow its food and appears to be having a choking sensation. The horse remains in that state until it chokes to death. David Mills this week lost three fine driving horses. He has had a veterinarian to look after his other stock. Mr. Mills' loss amounts to about \$900.

Another peculiar disease has broken out among the swine. When the hog takes sick it immediately turns a dark blue color and breaks out in spots like the smallpox. The loss around Milford amounts to about \$300 so far.

We are informed that two or three cases of anthrax was found on Monday in a herd of cattle in Blackbird hundred, on the farm of a Mr. Price. Dr. H. H. McDowell, veterinarian, was summoned and promptly had the affected cattle killed and quarantined the neighborhood. On Tuesday, in company with members of the State Board of Agriculture, he again visited the neighborhood and strict measures were taken to prevent the spreading of the dread disease. They immediately quarantined the whole district, and it is believed there will be no further trouble.
