

INJURIES PROVE FATAL.

J. Thomas Pennington, One of Kent's Best Citizens, Run Down by Taxicab and Killed - Funeral Largely Attended.

Mr. J. Thomas Pennington, one of the most prominent citizens of Galena, and of this county, died at Mercy Hospital, Baltimore, Saturday night, from the result of injuries received by being run down by a taxicab at Charles and Oliver streets, Baltimore, Wednesday afternoon, and reported in the News last week. Pennington was about to board a southbound St. Paul street car, when the taxicab struck him, throwing him into the street. He was taken to the hospital in the taxicab by the driver, George Martee, who was afterward arrested on the charge of assaulting Mr. Pennington, but was afterward released.

Dr. Chambers and Hines attended the injured citizen. He was brushed all over and his clothing torn in shreds. His glasses were smashed and his watch twisted from the wrist. His limb was operated on Friday and bones were broken, all of which he was conscious and showed nerve unshaken before in the hospital. J. Thomas Pennington was a retired farmer and business man of Galena. He owned stock in several of our leading banks and commercial enterprises and was a man of means. He had a very pleasant, cultured home, where he delighted to entertain his hosts of friends.

Mr. John Bacon, formerly of Kent county, passed away October 19th, 1909, in his 57th year, after a long serious illness of 10 months at his late residence, 521 N. Third Street, Camden, N. J. He leaves a widow, three daughters and three sons.
