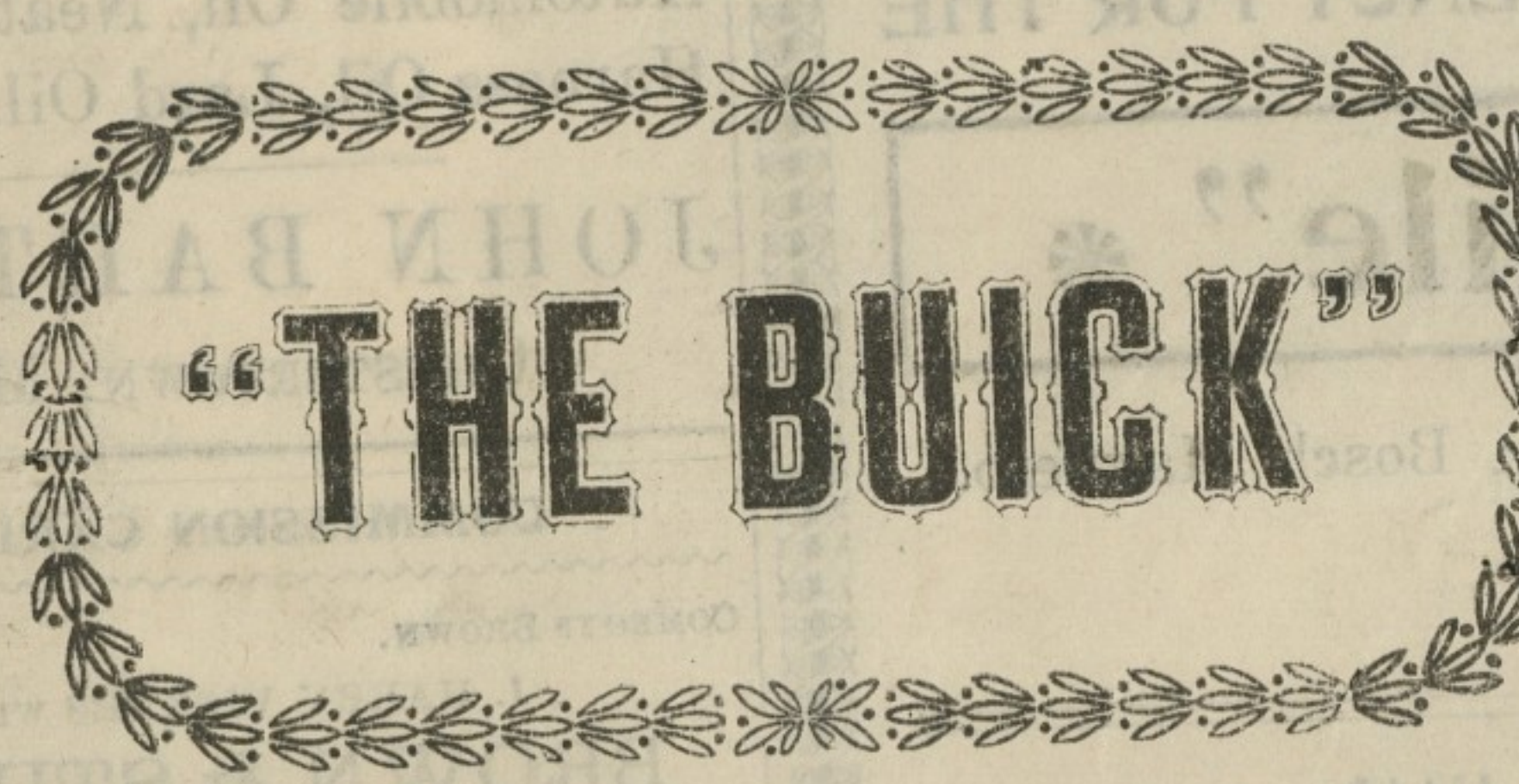

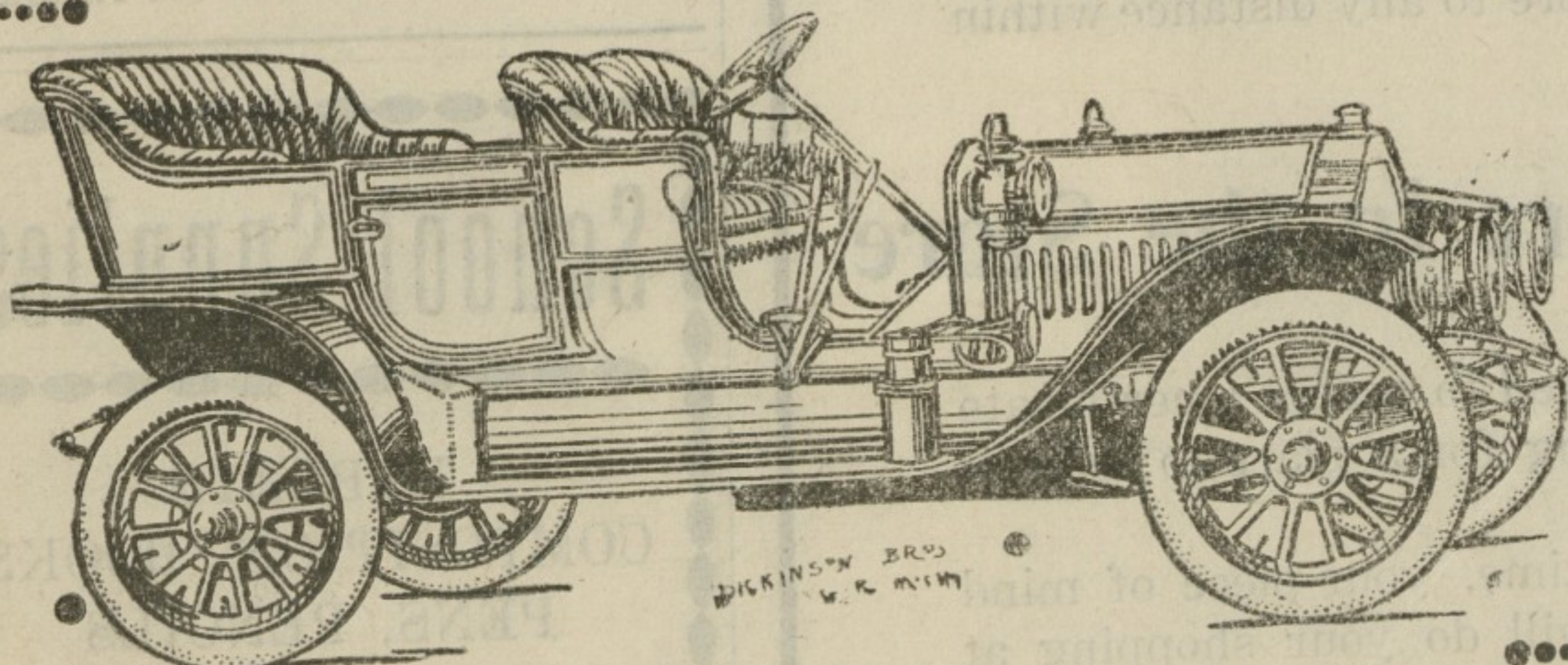

Mrs. William Stanley is the guest of her son in Delaware City.

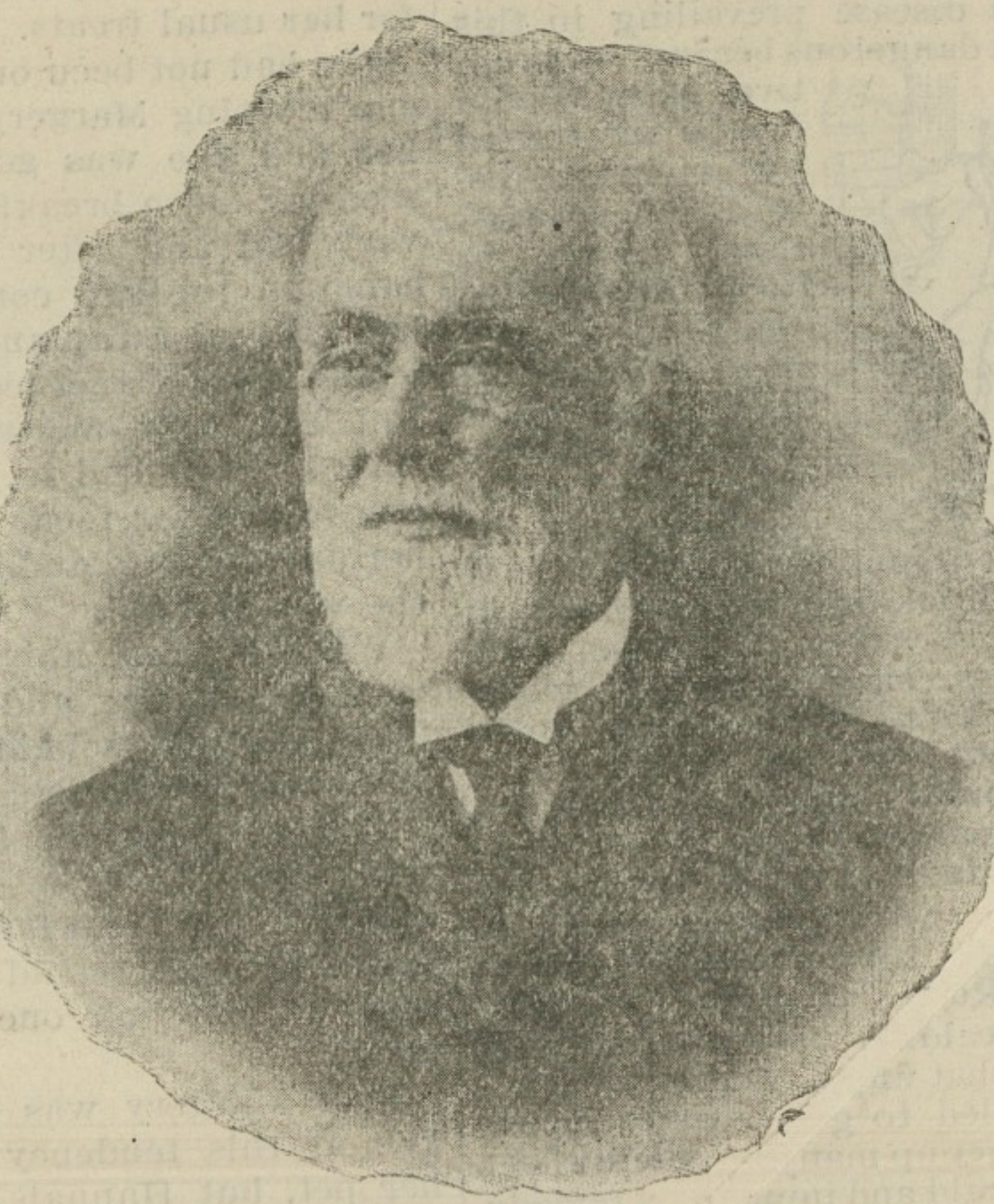
Mrs. Annie McCreedy and children left on Monday for Baltimore to spend a short time at home, from there will return to her home in Cambridge.
