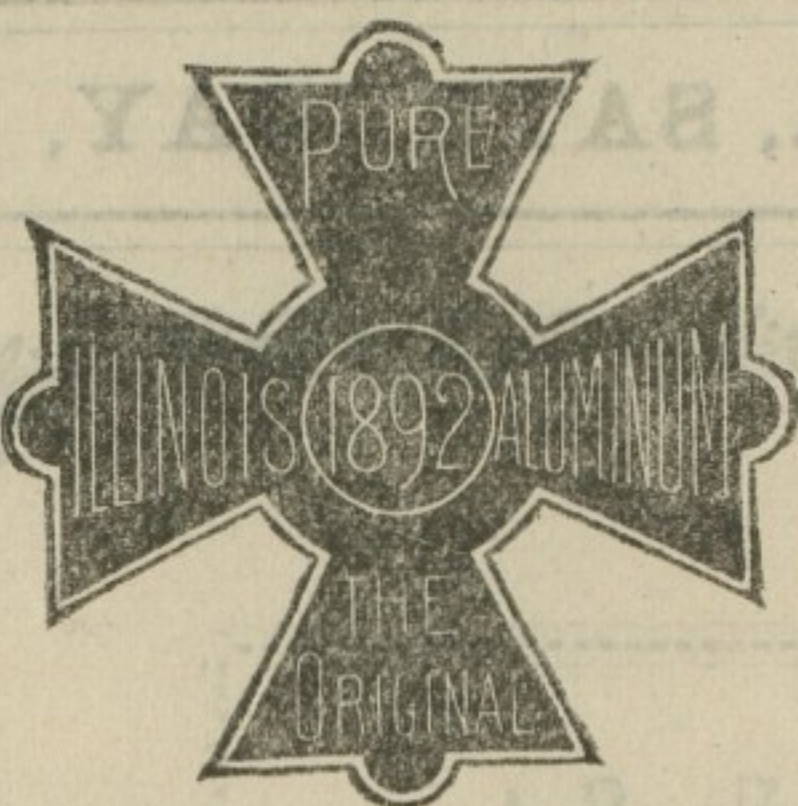

ENAMEL WARE CAUSES CANCER, SAYS DOCTOR

Tells Homeopaths Particles From Dishes Start Growths in Stomach.

ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 11.

INTRODUCTION of modern enamel ware in the kitchens of the country is responsible for many cases of cancer, was the striking theory advanced by Dr. William H. Dietrich, of New York, in a paper entitled, "Observations on the Etiology of Cancer," read before the Bureau of Sanitary Science and Public Health, at which leading experts of the International Homeopathic Congress met today to discuss questions of public health.

The argument advanced was that chipping of the hard-coated dishes used in preparation of meals allowed minute but dangerous particles of foreign matter to become mixed with the food. These are taken into the stomach, where the capacious growth is caused by abrasions which they make in the walls of the organ.

DR. MERRITT ACQUITTED

Jury Returns Verdict After Being Out Four Minutes. He Faces Another Charge.

Easton, Md., Nov. 27.—After being out four minutes this afternoon the jury in the case of Dr. James B. Merritt, charged with malpractice, returned a verdict of not guilty.

Immediately after he was declared free he surrendered to Sheriff Nichols, who held a writ from the authorities of Caroline county charging him with performing an illegal operation on Mrs. John Dean, of that county. On this charge he was released on \$5,000 bail for his appearance at Denton in April. His bondsmen were his wife, Mrs. Georgeanna Merritt, Alexander Fountain and William B. Shannahan.

The courtroom was crowded when the trial was resumed this morning. Dr. James B. Merritt was the target of the attorneys of Dr. Merritt. Dr. Stevens testified that Merritt told him he had performed the operation on Miss Southern.

The physicians were then driven together to the Southern home to consult on the condition of Miss Southern. This admission to Dr. Stevens was the most damaging testimony offered, so the attorneys of the defense were concentrated in an effort to show that some personal animus influenced Dr. Stevens.

Mrs. Merritt and Miss Merritt, the wife and daughter of the accused, testified that Dr. Stevens had called at their home after Merritt's departure and asked for a list of his patients. His request, they said, was refused.

Grand jurors were put on the stand to say that Dr. Stevens, when testifying before the State's inquest, had made no mention of this statement by Dr. Merritt that amounted to a confession.

The evidence was concluded and argument closed at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. Only one ballot was taken by the jury.

Storm and Weather Forecasts for December.

Rev. Ir R. Hicks' information for the month of December: A reactionary storm period is central on the 4th, 5th and 6th. But the probabilities are that the last storm in November will last one or two days in December, but the cold winds, especially in the eastern part of the country. A cold wave of much intensity will prevail over the western as well as the central sections of the country as we pass from November into December. From the 4th to the 7th the cold winds, especially in the eastern part of the country, will fall and renewed storms of rain and snow will prevail over most sections of the country. A regular storm period extends from the 9th to the 14th, being central on the 11th. A reactionary storm period is central on the 16th, 17th and 18th. A regular storm period extends on the 22nd, covers the 23th to 26th. This period is at the center of the winter solstice. In all reason it will bring heavy winter storms on the land and sea. These storms are apt to continue over the limits of the period in consequence of the lunar disturbances and the opposition of the moon on the 26th. A reactionary storm period is central on the 27th, 28th and 29th. On these days reversed storms of sleet and snow will sweep over most parts of the country and will be followed by high barometer, blizzards and very cold.
