Individually and collectively the world is better with the passing of each Christmas time. The announcement of the University of Copenhagen that Dr. Cook had failed to prove that he reached the North Pole, and that the papers which he submitted to establish his claims are worthless, has caused general and intense indignation in Denmark against the explorer. The University of Copenhagen accepted Dr. Cook's claim as valid, the King of Denmark showered honors upon him and the whole people received him with acclamation. To feel that a man had accepted all these distinctions and honors under false pretenses would naturally excite indignation.

In this country the feeling will be more of sadness than of anger. The head of the Royal Observatory at Brussels suggests the possibility that Cook made an honest mistake and actually believed he was at the Pole. There are many in this country who perhaps are hoping against hope that the records he said he left in the north, and which Commander Peary refused to bring back on his ship, may in the end justify Dr. Cook. But this seems to be a forlorn hope. Many Americans will feel that Dr. Cook has not only destroyed himself in the public estimation, but has in some degree humiliated his country in the eyes of Europe.

Doubtless, Mr. Peary and his ardent partisans received the news from Copenhagen with exultation. But it does not relieve Mr. Peary of the discredit he brought upon himself by his ugly conduct in this affair, from the time he refused to permit Dr. Cook's records and sag to come on his boat down to the present.

State Road Toward Rock Hall.

We are heartily in favor of the section below Centerville toward Rock Hall being improved roads. We believe if the citizens of this section make a determined effort the State Road Commission will begin a 3-mile road toward Rock Hall in the spring. If the State Road Commission cannot see their way clear to give this section a portion of the improved road fund, then we think our County Commissioners should take the question of taking advantage of the Shoemaker Act and build two or three miles of stone road between Rock Hall and Chestertown. The lower section of Kent have no railroad facilities and should have stone roads. Although the road from Rock Hall via Fairlee to Chestertown is not one of the main arteries in the State scheme of the commission connect the county towns of the yet it is one of the roads that will be improved by a stone road. On Jan. 1, 1910, new criminal code goes into effect, adopted by the last Congress. It forbids the shipping of liquor C. O. D. into dry territories, and provides that every package which does not bear the name of the person to whom it is shipped, the kind of liquor which it contains and the quality upon the outside, may be seized and condemned.

The efficiency of the Chestertown Volunteer Fire Co., was again demonstrated at the fire on Cross street, Wednesday. So threatening did the fire look at one time that the Wilmington Fire Department was telegraphed to hold itself in readiness to come to the town's assistance. The blaze was gotten under control at 3 o'clock and outside help was not required. A very important lesson should be learned by the authorities in requiring all new buildings to have either a metal or slate roof. The fire Wednesday skipped four slate roofs and caught into the shingle roofs of two dwellings. Providence and brick walls helped save the town from a conflagration.

A LARGER delegation of woman suffragists, including women and men, were before the City Council of Easton last Tuesday night urging them to amend the charter of Easton so as to grant the right of franchise to all women owning \$500 worth of property in the city to vote at municipal and Councilmanic elections, and to endorse a bill to be presented to the Legislature asking it to pass a law granting the right of franchise to all women in Easton who own property to the amount named.

The Council listened to the arguments and after considering them decided to accede to their demands. The Council also instructed its attorney to draft certain amendments to the charter of Easton which is the one granting the right of franchise to women at municipal and Councilmanic elections, which will be presented in the form of a bill to the Legislature. The action of the City Council seems to meet with the approval of the majority of the taxpayers in Easton.

Annual Society Meeting.—The Twenty-Third Annual Session of the Peninsula Horticultural Society will be held in Centerville, Maryland, January 11, 12, 13, 1910. The best fruit and vegetable growers on the Peninsula will discuss in written papers the most approved methods of horticulture, and in addition, there will be addresses by President Silvester, of the Maryland Agricultural College; Dr. Harter, of Delaware College; Prof. E. C. Myers, of the Pennsylvania State College; E. Cyrus Miller, of Haydensville, Mass.; H. B. Fullerton, Huntington, L. I., and Prof. W. W. Tracy, of the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition to all these papers the Experiment Station men of both Delaware and Maryland will be on hand to give the best up-to-date information in practical as well as scientific horticulture. Mr. Myers will give two addresses—'Experiments with Cabbage, Tomatoes and Asparagus at the Pennsylvania State College, and 'Garden Crops That Pay and How to Grow Them.' The latter topic will include a discussion on potato growing. E. Cyrus Miller is a very successful apple grower in Massachusetts and he will bring with him lantern slides to illustrate his talk. Mr. Fullerton was at the Peninsula meeting last year and gave a very instructive and interesting lantern slide talk on 'Market Gardening on Long Island.' Prof. Tracy has been interested in the improvement of seeds for many years. He was with a prominent seed company until a few years ago when his work attracted so much attention that he was invited to give his services to the United States Department of Agriculture.
