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AUTO LICENSE TAGS CHEAPER NEXT YEAR

Good news for Maryland motorists! Automobile license tags—those little metal strips which change colors each year and which are absolutely necessary to operate a machine over Maryland roads—for 1924 will cost next to nothing.
Beginning with January 1 next the flivver owner no longer will hand over nearly \$14 for the privilege of operating his "lizzie," while the owner of the luxurious speedster, who has power to spare, drops a mere \$10 bill for a similar set of tags.
It is all because the 2 cents a gallon tax on gasoline goes into effect on that day and the old system of taxing by diameter of piston and length of stroke, which was fondly supposed by some to designate the horsepower of the motor, will be thrown into the discard.
Tags next year will cost exactly what it costs to make them plus a slight charge for overhead made necessary by the persons in the employ of the Automobile Commissioner. It will be \$2 or \$3 at most.

TO SELL EASTERN SHORE RAILROADS

Two of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's "white-elephant" subsidiaries—the Maryland, Delaware and Virginia and the Baltimore, Chesapeake and Atlantic railroads—are to be sold under foreclosure proceedings some time soon, according to information received in banking circles. As there seems to be no other likely bidder and as the Pennsylvania could not afford to have either of these roads pass into other hands, it is generally expected that the Pennsylvania itself will be the purchaser. As parts of the Pennsylvania system they are regarded as good "feeders," but the cream of their profits go to the controlling road, according to railroad men.
Directors of the subsidiaries admit that the controlling company is working on plans for foreclosing the mortgages on the two roads, but as most of these directors are merely representatives of the Pennsylvania, they refer inquiries to Pennsylvania officials. It is known that Pennsylvania officials have been holding conferences with the subsidiary directors on plans for the readjustment of the affairs of the two Eastern Shore roads.
These conferences have indicated that there was no likely way out of the financial tangle in which the roads are involved except through foreclosure on the mortgages on the roads, both of which are in default.

SALISBURY WANTS M. E. CONFERENCE

Thinking Chincoteague, Va., is too distant and lacks necessary accommodations, some Methodists are proposing that the Wilmington Conference revoke its decision to meet at Chincoteague in April and decide to accept the hospitality of Salisbury, which has promised to entertain the conference if Chincoteague cannot.
Rev. L. B. Morgan, pastor at Chincoteague, insists that the conference meet there and declares the island can perform the task it has undertaken. He also announces that the road and bridge between the island and the mainland will be in good condition by spring.
Members of the conference say "it is up to Mr. Morgan."

Prophecies 18 Storms

Conrad Diehl, Goshen's weather prophet, expects 18 more storms this winter. According to the old system of reckoning, he says, we are to get 25 in all, and we already have had eight. He arrives at this conclusion because the first snowstorm of the season came on November 26, and it is held that the number of snows is governed by the date on which the first storm appears. Diehl, who is in his 86th year, has been a close observer of the weather all his life, and his friends declare that his predictions have come true more often than those of Devoe, of Hackensack, who predicted a warm December.

Church, the Ladies' Aid Society, The Young Men's Club, The Sunday School, and The Triangle Club, have presented to the church a full set of banquet dishes which were used for the first time at the annual banquet and reception of the Young Men's Club, in the lecture room of the church, January 11. They were purchased thru Miss Minnie Hudson, of the H. B. Rote Jewelry Store.

Mrs. Emma Beck, of Sudlersville, has just been awarded \$6,000 damages by the courts of Florida for injuries sustained two years ago when she was hurt by a break in the pavement at Lakeland where she was visiting her sister, Mrs. Edgar Wilson. Mrs. Beck's hip was broken and the injury is permanent. The town took an appeal from the verdict of the jury, but the higher court upheld the award.
