The question of additional fire fighting equipment was discussed and all agreed on its great need. It was finally decided to purchase a truck on which the ladders and hose might be carried as well as two chemical tanks, also is equipped with a pump which may be utilized in pumping water from Chester river or elsewhere and would be especially available in case of a fire near the water front.

A Ford truck may be bought for \$3,000 and a Reo for \$4,200. The amount of money raised by the citizens of Chestertown will determine which one of these machines are purchased.
