CHESTERTOWN FIRE LOSS PUT AT \$15,000

Large Clendaniel Garage, Massey & Kilbourne's Warehouse, A Double Dwelling, All Destroyed—Several Other Buildings Take Fire—Splendid Work by Volunteer Firemen, Under Chief Wright.

The fire which visited Chestertown at 9.30 o'clock Easter Monday morning destroyed John E. Speicher, Jr.'s big garage, spread to Massey & Kilbourne's warehouse, near the depot, which was filled with seed, salt and seed potatoes, and consumed a double building occupied by Samuel Frisby and Rose Stricklin on the north side of the garage, where the progress of the flames was arrested. Shower of sparks, caused by a high wind, for a time threatened widespread destruction. H. D. Orem & Son's big machinery and implement property was on fire repeatedly, but the efficient work of the fire company, under Chief Walter Wright's direction, saved it. The proximity of the Hearn Company's oil tanks caused calls for help to be sent to neighboring towns, and Centerville sent a truck and an engine and Easton and Elkton started apparatus, but turned back when notified that their aid would not be needed. The garage belonged to John H. Clendaniel, Jr., and was rented to J. E. Speicher, Jr. The latter lost three cars. There were also stored cars burned, belonging to S. G. Caldwell and Louis Rust, and a truck belonging to Kent county. Mr. Clendaniel had \$3,000 insurance on the garage and \$600 on the double dwelling. Mr. Speicher had \$3,000 blanket insurance with W. Bell Townsend on accessories, etc., but will lose about \$1,000 on cars. Two new cars insured with George W. French were saved, one having the top burned off as it was pushed from the burning building. Massey & Kilbourne had \$1,000 on the building and some on the contents. They lost a carload of salt. The big warehouse opposite and owned by Jones & Satterfield was saved by keeping it saturated with water. In it were 40 new carriages belonging to H. S. Deford. The total loss is put at \$15,000, with about one-fourth carried by insurance. Chestertown has a noble and efficient volunteer fire company, but no engine or truck. A committee, consisting of Fred. G. Usilton, John C. Davis, Wm. G. Smyth, W. P. Newman and J. Hyde Thompson have been appointed by citizens to raise funds for the purchase of the apparatus needed. The committee has in hand a considerable sum, but needs more. The town has been divided into five districts and the collector in each district will be glad to hear from residents. Don't wait to be called upon. It is your home that might go next. Who knows?

DEATH OF WM. W. BECK



William W. Beck, chairman of the State Tax Commission and one of the leading Democratic political leaders of the Eastern Shore, died Thursday morning at Johns Hopkins Hospital following a severe attack of influenza and a general breakdown of health. His death was hastened by an acute attack of kidney trouble, which developed within the last few days. He was surrounded by intimate members of his family when he died, one of whom was a sister—Miss Isabel Beck—who nursed him during his illness.

The death of Mr. Beck removes a man who has been one of Governor Ritchie's closest personal friends and advisors. Mr. Beck has been in poor health for several months. He continued working at his office against the advice of his friends. Shortly before he gave up, right after he returned from a serious attack of influenza, Governor Ritchie and other of Mr. Beck's friends had difficulty getting Mr. Beck to agree to leave his duties at the commission. In fact, his friends claim that he gave up too late.

Later he was moved to Johns Hopkins for special treatment. At the hospital his condition became worse, and the kidney and stomach complications set in. He has been lingering between life and death for the last three or four days. Mr. Beck was born in Chestertown, February 15, 1870. He was the son of Dr. Samuel Beck, a prominent physician and former Clerk of Court. He first went to the public schools of Chestertown and then to Washington College. At the completion of studies at Washington College he entered the Naval Academy. He studied law at the University of Maryland, from which he graduated in 1898. He was State's Attorney of Kent county for eight years, having been elected twice. He served in the State Senate from 1912 until 1916. He was one of the most active members in the Senate, and was the author of several important laws. He was made a member of the State Tax Commission by Governor Harrington in June, 1918.

Mr. Beck was also a member of the Board of Visitors of Washington College and of the Eastern Shore State Hospital at Cambridge. He was a member of Chester Lodge of Masons and of the Modern Woodman. The active pallbearers will be Judge Lewin W. Wickes, Allan A. Harris, J. Arthur Bradley, Harrison W. Vickers, chairman of the State Conservation Commission; William H. Bryan, Reynolds C. Bedford, of Scranton, Pa.; M. J. Mandelbaum, of Cleveland, Ohio, and S. Scott Beck, Chestertown.

BETTER TELEPHONE SERVICE
Talking by telephone from the Eastern Shore to Baltimore and New York has increased so much recently that The Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company is about to provide telephone circuits to carry this increased business. This will include increased facilities to Salisbury, Chestertown, Cambridge, Easton and other points. At the meeting of the Executive Committee today the expenditure of \$27,000 was authorized for these additional circuits, and orders were given to commence work at once. This is a part of an appropriation of \$37,000 for general improvement and extension work in Maryland. It is a part of the Company's program for 1923. The telephone circuits which give Eastern Shore connection with Baltimore and New York are contained in a submarine cable connecting Salisbury, which runs across the bay from Sandy Point on the Western Shore, to Love Point on the Eastern Shore. Certain of these lines are allotted for New York calls and certain ones for messages to Baltimore. New lines are also being run between Chestertown and Elkton, Cambridge and Salisbury and Cambridge and Easton. This work will involve about three hundred and thirty-five miles of aerial wire and fourteen hundred feet of submarine cable in the Choptank river and Kent Narrows. The existing cable across the Chesapeake Bay has sufficient spare wires to provide for the new circuits.
