WIND AND HAIL STRIKE CHESTERTOWN & VICINITY!
Berterton, Tolchester, Rock Hall and Bay Resorts Escape Big Storm Wednesday Afternoon—Seemed to Break Over Chestertown—Corn and Tomatoes Damaged—3 Cows Killed—Autos Damaged.

The proverbial July 4th storm arrived in Kent about 4.30. It was accompanied by wind and hail and spent its force principally in Chestertown and vicinity. Beginning about a mile this side of Fairlee the hail did considerable damage to corn and tomato plants cutting a wide territory from George Hatcher's across Paul Massey's to Tilden Bric's, Jos. Walbert and others along Lankford down in Quaker Neck where Edgar Strong, Will Maslin, Fred Davis and others were hit. Three cows were killed by lightning on Frank Shinn's farm near Pomona.

Chestertown seemed to be in the center of the wind storm. A large tree in front of James Leates' home near College street, fell with a crash on Mr. Geiser's auto smashing the top only. He extricated it from the tree and rode to his home in Worton in it. Another large tree in George Chaires' yard also fell but did not hurt an auto which was hit by a limb.

A large tree on Cannon street, near Bacchus' coal yard, fell blocking the street. In Charles L. Gill's yard was a large willow. It was blown down and crashed through Walter S. Trew's carriage house. J. F. Thompson's auto was stored in the house and it was somewhat damaged.

The seriousness of the hail damage will not be known for some weeks. It is to be hoped that time will enable the tomato and corn to outgrow the effect.

This will be a part of the State and Nation-wide movement to organize the industry of agriculture into a compact, aggressive, and successful organization.

The committee composed of J. F. Shahan, E. Thomas Massey, Holt Woodall, Samuel Conly, Merrick Clements, Edgar Pennington, Albert Jervis, Arthur Bric, Sewell Lee, B. F. Rash, James E. Morris, D. W. Ingersoll, Tilden Bric, Jr., Earl Nicholson, and M. P. Edwards met last week and outlined the program of activity in detail.

In the Farm Bureau Edition will appear the history of this gigantic organization of agriculturists, its purposes, and accomplishments, mentioning those material leaders who are taking an enthusiastic interest in the organization of which, it is believed, will be the means of insuring increased prosperity and improved business conditions for both the farmers and business men that are wholly and partially dependent upon the success of agriculture.

The Farm Bureau already is the largest farmers' organization in the history of the world, having a membership of over a million and a half, organized in forty-eight states and over twenty-seven hundred counties. It is a non-political, non-sectarian organization, organized on the great principle of "live and let live." The individual farmer is the smallest unit, banded into local or community units, which in turn are federated into the County Farm Bureau, County Farm Bureaus into the State Farm Bureau, State Farm Bureaus into American Farm Bureau. In this way the Farm Bureau is built correctly in the principles of Democracy, which insures its preservation and the confidence of the people.
