Miss Jones spent the week-end with Miss Gladys Culley, of Gratitude, near Rock Hall.

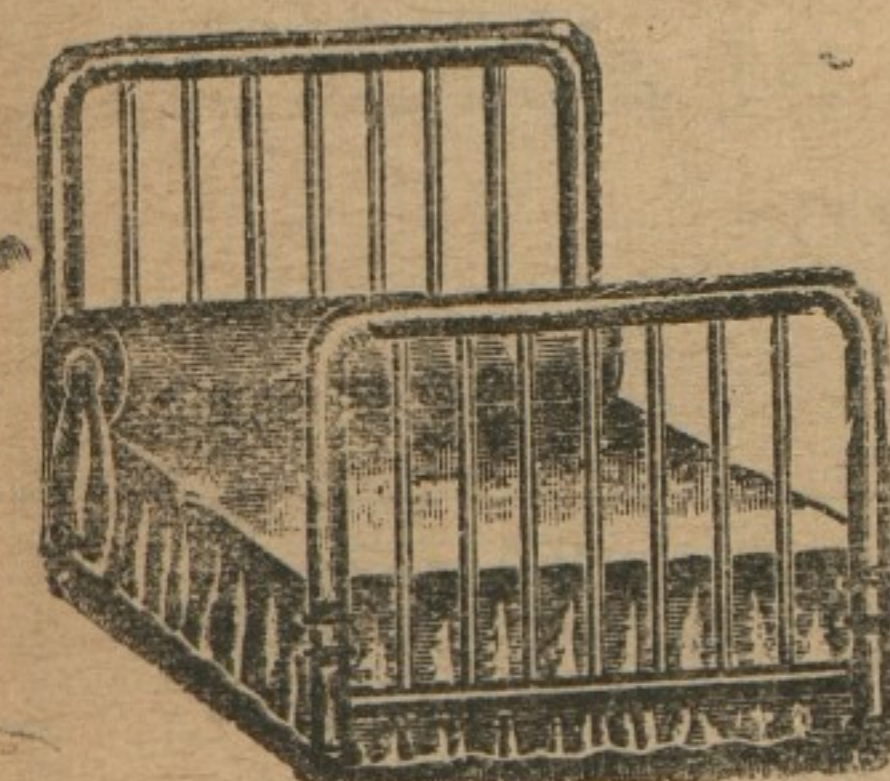
