Joseph Mallalieu died at his home in Millington on Friday morning, October 5th. His immediate death was caused by a slight stroke factory by paralysis. He was 82 years of age last May. He leaves a widow who was Miss Warner, a daughter of Rev. William Warner, of Millington M. E. Conference. Also two daughters, Mrs. R. Oscar Roe, of Sucessville, and Mrs. John Higman, of Millington, and two sons, John F. Mallalieu, of Millington, and W. Warner Mallalieu, of Millington. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Annie M. Jenkins, of Trappe, Md., and Mrs. Mary Adams, of Rehoboth, Del. He was a leading member of Millington M. E. Church for the last 25 years and was a grand old man. He was a member of the old firm of Thomas Mallalieu & Sons, the celebrated makers of kensley cloth. Their reputation extended to several states. He was a thoroughbred Englishman. Mr. Mallalieu was born in England, in the year 1841, and served in the Legislature of 1881 from Queen Anne's. Being the only Republican that has ever been elected from Queen Anne's since the Civil War for any office.

The funeral will take place next Monday from his late residence in Millington at 11 a. m. Rev. G. F. Millington will officiate. He was perhaps the oldest living Mason in Kent county, having been a Mason for about 61 years.

Walter Bennett, on the Avenue, says he can't compete in blooms but has a plant 11 feet high. Randolph Waddell has some pretty blooms on High street.
