the night of July 16 and was drowned. His father, Chas. F. Herbert, brought U the suit, through J. C. France and A. S. J. Owens, attorneys. It is alleged that the wharf was not provided with rails or safeguards to prevent persons falling into the water and there were no lights to warn persons on the night the accident occurred. 





PROFITABLE APPLE CROP. Mr. Miller's Apple Orchard Will Yield Him

\$15,000 — A State Association.

John Miller, of the vicinity of Guardstown, W. Va., will realize about \$15,000 in round numbers from his apple orchard this year, when he disposes of his entire crop. He has just completed the delivery of 6,000 barrels, sold at \$2.42 per barrel, amounting to the gross sum of \$14,520. These are raised upon thirty-The four acres of land purchased by Mr. Miller twenty years ago at \$8 an acre. Mr. Miller also netted about \$5,000 on his peaches. His father—Wm. S. Miller -who had a finer quality of apples, disposed of his entire crop, aggregating about 3,000 barrels at \$2.56 a barrel. Each of them is now planting a hundred acres more in fruit trees. The fruit crop sn the county, including apples, peaches and the smaller varieties, was not full this year by at least half, although the heavy yield of some isolated orchards would seem to indicate otherwise.
