



Coming to the Vulcan storm period extending from the 18th to 23rd, we see that Mars, Earth and Mercury all lend their disturbing powers to the period. During this period we also find that the moon is at her full on the 18th and the celestial equator on the 21st. Earth will have entered far enough into the autumnal equinox at this time, to make it possible for dangerous storms to appear on the southern seas and coasts.
