

Every negro vote lost is a loss to the Republicans, and an election law that makes it difficult for the negro to vote, is, of course, to the disadvantage of that party.

They do not declare that they are fighting it because it deprives them of some of their negro votes, or that it is an infringement upon the rights of the negro. They announce that the ballots are so complicated that the average citizen bannot vote them, and try to impress the people with the idea that a man of ordinary intelligence cannot vote.


