

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the slaughtering of Beeves, Sheep, Lambs, Hogs, or other ani-

Be it ordained by the Town Commissioners The Government pays Railway Mail of Chestertown, That no person, persons or corporation shall slaughter any beeves, sheep, Clerks \$800 to \$1,200, and other lambs, hogs, or other animals, within the corporate limits of Chestertown on and after the employees up to \$2,500 annually. FIRST DAY OP MAY, 1910; and any person, shall pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs of prosecution for each and every animal so slaughtered.
