SUMMARY.

Abraham Brown, near Bristol, Penth was killed last week by a fall from 3 tree. Being in pursuit of a swarm of bees, he ascended the tree, and laying hold of a limb which he thought sound, but which unhappily proved decayed, it broke, and he fell about 40 feet to the ground, where he was found lifeless.

At the last Brighton cattle show, general H. A. S. Dearborn, exhibited a glass hive, which had been filled with honeycomb in 22 days, and was supposed to weigh 100 pounds.

The celebrated Mr. Owen, of Lanark, Scotland, has purchased the Harmony Establishment, and is about to emigrate to the United States.
