Lettuce.—It should be sowed as eat as it can be raked into the ground, f Hammond sows a bed for early lettuce late in the preceeding fall. It ought to be sowed in rows sixteen inches aparu between vacant rows intended for some other plant. For as the lettuce will soon be pulled out, other rows of late vegetables may occupy the whole bed.

Radishes.—Should be sowed in drills eight inches apart, the last week March. The beds should be made horse manure fresh from the stables well mulched with good garden mould. Off loosen the soil about them while growing and keep the weeds out. .

Onions .- They should be sowed about the 28th of April, in drills sixteen inch es apart, made very shallow, not exceen lightly lengthwise the drills. The bear having been well worked with thorough ly rotted manure, at least five inches about fourteen days.

Hoe them as soon as they are just up sufficiently to be heed carefully without injury. Let them be hoed six or seven times during the season. The beds should be previous well worked and manured; and alt wards frequently hoed, which is all care required.
