As might have been ex-Pected, it is inflexibly and unalterably opposed to the establishment of a National Bank, and goes for a perfect separation of the Government from all Banks, State or National. Mr. Van Buren recommends an absolute divorce, between the revenue of the Nation, and all paper corporations. There is no flinching or dodging, nor non committalism, in this propound and argumentative Message. Our readers shall be furnished with a perusal of it in our next paper.
