

----NATIONAL BANKS .- Hon. J. J. Knox, Comptroller of the Currency, has rendered his sixteenth annual report. According to the report, the number of State banks and private banking-houses is 4,400, with an aggregate capital of \$205,380,000, and deposits amounting to \$1,242,790,00. The total number of national banks in existence June 29th, 1878, was 2,056, with a capital of \$470,390,000,-Their deposits amounted to \$677,160,000. Out of all the national banks organized since 1863, only 74 have been placed in the hands of receivers. The total amount of taxes collected from the banks, on circulation, capital and deposits, foots up \$86,034,554.40. Mr. Knox states that the national banks have been of great service to the Government in funding the six per cents into four per cents, by negotiating and absorbing a large amount of the new issue of bonds.
