At the same time Judge Keating presented a number of copies to the South Pratt Library in Baltimore & they are among their newspaper collection in the library on Cathedral Street. (See file in the Pratt Library Dec. 4-1860 - Sept. 10-1861.)

Quote from a letter to Judge Keating from the Pratt Library Adm. Asst. "We value these files for their historical importance."

These papers were salvaged from the fire which burned Mr. Keating's office & printing press there in the street by some who did not agree with editorials he was writing.
