THE CENSUS.—The population of Worcester county, Md., by the new census is 20,581, an increase of 1,762 since 1850. The population of the principal towns in the county is as follows: Snow Hill, 965; Berlin, 834; New Town, 702; Whaleysville, 152; Sandy Hill, 112.

The population of Cumberland, Md. is 7,300, which is an increase of 1,100 over 1850. The valuation of property in the town is \$2,224,400. The corporation tax is 40 cents, county tax 59 cents and State tax 10 cents.

[Correspondence of the Baltimore Sun] Petersburg, VA., August the 21. Editors Baltimore Sun:-Be so kind as to inform me by return mail if the last Legislature of Maryland passed a law prohibiting the manumission of slaves after a certain time and oblige, &c. O.

As the matter of inquiry presented in the foregoing is of general interest and may not be universally known, we answer through the columns of The Sun .-Yes. The last Legislature did pass such a law, and it went into effect on the first of June last. The law is thus stated in the New Code, art. 66, sec. 42:

"No slave shall henceforth be manumitted by deed or by last will and testament, nor shall the fact of negro's going at large and acting as free or not being claimed by an owner. be considered as evidence of the execution heretofore of any deed or will manumitting the party or as a ground for presuming freedom; provided, that this section shall not apply to such negroes as may have been heretofore manumitted by deed or by the last will and testament of a deceased pernot arrived, and who are now in services
