

Spine extending from shoulder blade half way down the back.

If death were occasioned by a blow if the stab immediately followed, blood would soon flow.

If stab were made under left nipple between 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> ribs, there would be effusion of blood externally from the skin - whether there would depend upon the extent of the penetration.

There would have been no difficulty in removing blood which flowed into body from a stab after death caused by blow.

In post mortem exam<sup>n</sup>. there would be but slight external effusion of blood - I have known them made in this way - they could be made without external effusion of blood.

I made examinations of spots on the side of the stain way leading to the lower laboratory. I satisfied myself by positive evidence that they were not blood. They were tobacco spit. They were below when the urinals of copper were found.

I discovered nothing positive as to the spots being up. I supposed them to be spots of Nitrate of Copper.
