Dear Dr. Jones:

As per our conversation on the phone yesterday, I herewith submit my reasons for believing that we should have the right to pay a smaller fee than the \$100 which you charge on manufactured meat products.

In the first place, we only manufacture sausage meat, sorapple and pudding. The nature of our business is such that as
